# Simply Stephen Smith's Spokes Speaks

Happy Friday morning to all. Before I begin writing about the 5th of 7 Rotary Foundation Areas of Focus, Supporting Education, I wanted to briefly mention about the 4th Rotary Foundation Areas of Focus, Saving Mothers and Children, which I touched on last week. I forgot to mention about our clubs Rotary RI Grant for heart surgeries for children in India. Our club, along with Madras South Rotary in Chennai have done 500 heart surgeries with 3 Global Grants. That is an incredible achievement and I am sure that we, as a club, are proud of what we have been able to do to help those less fortunate than us.

More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. That's 17% of the world's adult population. Rotary International's goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce disparity in education, and increase adult literacy. The Rotary Foundation supports education through scholarships, donations, and service projects around the world.

In Afghanistan, Rotary members opened a girl's school to break the cycle of poverty and social imbalance. Rotary members in the United States partnered with Proliteracy Detroit to recruit and train tutors after a study showed more than half of the local adult population was functionally illiterate.

The SOUNS program in South Africa, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. teaches educators how to improve literacy by teaching children to recognize letters by sounds instead of names. In Kenya, Rotary clubs are working with the Global Partnership for Education and local and national governments to advance life-long learning opportunities for poor and marginalized children.

As members of Rotary, we are people of action and our actions have the power to speak loud and clear. Our vision and commitment to finding solutions keeps us connected to those who need it most, changing lives and creating opportunities about groundbreaking work in education and literacy. There are more kids enrolled in school now than at any point in history which is why supporting teachers is key. We believe that education creates security and safety in families so they can support, provide and make informed decisions. Please consider supporting the Rotary Foundation.

He announced he was excited to join with us, and he, too, admitted he "was also a disco guy in the 1970's." *(photo right)*





**Tammy Silver** introduced our speaker, Patrick Conner, on Mai Tai Magic and his experiences researching and reviving "The Tiki Culture" in America. Our audience was rapt with attention as Patrick stood behind a raised table with bottles, a bucket of ice and a shiny chrome cocktail shaker.

Patrick's background as a professional sales and marketing career at several major Fortune 500 companies, and an accomplished Ironman finisher, all began as a bartender at London's iconic Embassy Club in the 1970's (he, too, admitted to being a disco dancer, in keeping with today's revelations). After retiring, and during the Pandemic lockdown, he decided to revive his college experience as a high-end mixologist, focusing on both the classic Mai Tai cocktail, and the history and culture



behind the famous beverage. After we all had a University Člub hand-mixed Mai Tai sample that was prepared and passed to everyone in the room, this might become the new official Pasadena Rotary cocktail, alongside the famous **PP Mary Lou** Manhattan (two maximum, as we all learned in years past).

Your reporter has pages of notes, so we will need a bibliography attached for those who want to know more about the history of the Mai Tai, and the Tiki culture, but it seems to have started in 1934 by a dedicated guy named Donn Beach, or Don the Beachcomber, with a bar in Hollywood, "which became the epicenter of tiki culture. It was soon followed by Victor Bergeron, "Trader Vic", by renaming his Oakland, CA bar from Hinky Dinks to Trader Vic's in 1937. The Mai Tai craze was on, started by using Wray & Nephew 17-year-old rum, but it soon



depleted the world's rum supplies. Each claimed to have invented the classic Mai Tai, the 1950'S and 60's became a boom time for Tiki Restaurants nationwide, but they fell out of favor in the 70's and 80's (did Disco kill the Tiki bar?).

The Tiki culture fascination is back led by a New Orleans bar Beachbum Berry's Latitude 29, and a whole series called Beachbum Berry Remixed, and others led the way in 2000's.

Time to taste the winner of our speaker's extensive research to the original Mai Tai, as celebrated in its heyday of 1950's. Here is the Original 1944 Recipe from Trader Vic's:

- · One ounce fresh squeezed lime juice
- · ¼ ounce of Orgeat (an almond simple syrup)
- ½ ounce of Orange Curacao
- ¼ ounce of demerara syrup
- · 2 ounces of Denizen's Merchant Reserve 8-

#### Year Rum

- · Fill old-fashioned glass with crushed ice
- · Shake all ingredients over ice and strain over the crushed ice
- · Garnish with a spent lime shell (peel side up) and a sprig of mint.

PP Mel Cohen was a lucky recipient of the sample created in front of us, while the whole club received a one-ounce version, which at noon was just enough to go out and enjoy the rest of the day, either back at the office or heading to the beach.






