Bill Shula recognized the newest Paul Harris Society member Sue Taylor. He presented a certificate to Susan for her continued generosity.

Karla Garret Harshaw introduced Sue Edwards and Mike Riordin, our quest speakers, who gave a presentation on a new formal partnership between Wright State University and Premier Health.

Wright State and Premier Health have had a long-standing informal alignment since 1968. In that year, when Wright State was just a year old, the school initiated the region's first bachelor in nursing degree, in cooperation with Miami Valley Hospital. In 1975, the medical school opened; in 1976, Miami Valley Hospital became the primary site for professionals to train; in 1979 Wright State formed a Masters in Nursing Degree and in 1981, Miami Valley Hospital and Wright State University formed a joint committee to develop the nursing education for the region. In 1991, they began collaborating in medical research; in 2012 a clinical trial alliance began; and in 2015, formed a neuroscience institute.

The question of how to improve access and quality of health care in the region was the underlying principle from day one in 2020 when Mike and Sue began discussing how to improve the academics and the workforce alignment. Both recognized a formal relationship would have a huge impact across the entire region. A strategic plan was formulated between Premier Health and Wright State University that will advance academic medicine, improve community health, bolster the workforce and economic development as well as become the destination for future health professionals through offering an unparalleled academic and experiential learning environment.

They pointed out that our region is the only one in Ohio and the largest metropolitan region in the US that does not benefit from a formal relationship between a health care system and a medical school. And, included in our region is the largest single-site employer in the state, Wright

Mike noted the main market competition is out migration, approximately 1.2 billion dollars of clinical care leaves this community and goes to Columbus, Cleveland or Cincinnati. People want to be treated close to home, whatever service they may need.

To provide high quality education for medical professionals is expensive. Premier Health has been providing training to medical students without outside help. The partnership will open up federal dollars in our region, currently other regions with teaching hospitals benefit from \$500m in additional support.

An added benefit of the partnership is the creation of a regional residency, as many medical residents ultimately plant roots in the community where they learn. The program will bring approximately 150 residents to the area. The ultimate goal is to make the environment good so that they come to work for Premier, in the long run all boats float.
