Holly Wiggins introduced Vivette Bowling who is new to United Way. She also shared that United Way is taking over the Tour de Gem event which will be kicking off soon.

Water Fact Rotary international announced a \$2 million dollar project supporting farmers in India who have been affected by climate change to help them grow their crops. This gift will help 60,000 farmers increase their income and what they are able to farm. Sarah also shared that 99% of the communities in this region pull their water from the ground and that water is too important for us to take for granted.

â€"Fran Rickenbach gave a Day 100 to Dayton Rotary club sharing that we are concluding the fourth year of hybrid meetings. She is grateful for our club's continuing devotion to hybrid meetings.

Foundation check presentation Rick Thie came forward with a foundation check presentation for \$3,000 to Pink Ribbon Good which offers practical help for individuals impacted by breast and gynecological cancers. Support includes rides to treatment, meals for clients and household family members, house cleaning essentials and peer support. Stacey Kirksey came forward and shared she has been a client with PRG since 2020 when she was diagnosed with metastatic breast cancer. "They know before we know what we are going to need and make sure we don't travel that road alone.†and now Stacy gets to return the favor and work with the organization and help others who are coming behind her and need the same help she did.

Nikola Borenovic who is Serbian from Bosnia gave a presentation about his youth exchange experience in Beavercreek. He thanked Dayton Rotary for what he thinks is the best year of his life. He gave a terrific presentation on Bosnia and Herzegovina, which is situated in the western Balkan peninsula of Europe. The population is 3,400,000 with a mixture of Bosniaks, Serbians and Croats throughout the country. The Dayton Peace Agreement following the breakup of Yugoslavia with an agreement reached on Nov. 21 2005 in Dayton. He is from Banja Luka which is the capital of the Serb republic and is home to 200,000 people. Sarajevo is the capital city and host of the 1984 Winter Olympics. He shared about his experience here in the states and photos and stories from living with his two host families.

Chair of the day, Diane Welborn came forward to give background on the presentation â€Clean Water: From Dayton to Ecuadorâ€

Dottie Meade, District Governor, Rotary District 6670 She shared a rour minute video thanks to the Tandaha Foundation which was the partner in this work. The video was a celebration of the conclusion of a six-year long project and the arrival of clean water into the community in San Jan de Inguincho, Ecuador which is 11,000 feet up in the Andes north of Quito. The sustainable water project that has finished will create a healthier and more resilient community for generations to come.

Diane called Fred Abrams forward who shared details of the project. He began with an overview of the five Dayton Rotary International Projects that have taken place from 2007-2024. There has been \$500,000 spent on projects in this club over the last 17 years including several projects in Africa. The Ecuador Project Timeline spanned 2018-2024. The grant was approved under the \hat{a} ecmatch \hat{a} e wire where Rotary International matched 100% of the district funds and 50% of what the club raised. With this money \$79,408 was sent to Ecuador. The project was complex with a 6.4 KM pipeline from the new location to the community that was going to be served. The majority of labor was completed by the people of San Juan de Inguincho. The value of their labor is estimated at \$36,000 with the 6.4 KM of pipeline was dug and done by the community. On May 7, 2022 the community celebrated clean water with ceremonies, speeches, eating and dancing. As part of the process of bringing clean water into the community they were taught how to do proper handwashing. Unfortunately, in June 2022 there was a major landslide that took out part of the pipeline. A Landslide Recovery Project was enacted and raised \$3,650 and District 6670 matched those funds. Work on a new cross-country landslide proof pipeline began and on February 3, 2024 the community celebrated abundant, clean, safe water.

Anna Taft, Founding Director of the Tandaa Foundation (<u>The Tandana Foundation - Who We Are</u>) was introduced who was key in helping begin discussion on this project in 2018. Anna joined us via Zoom and thanked the club for all that Rotary did. She spoke about the teamwork, contributions and persistence for overcoming challenges and thanked Diane and Fred for their attention to this project and continuing to move this forward. She also shared the Tanada Foundation offers *trips with intention* that members could look into participating with in the future.

Rotary members past and present from Ecuador joined via Zoom sharing that this project is "what all of the Rotary values are.†Fred and Diane were thanked for following through on making this dream a reality for this community. "The community started to believe in themselves and in other people.†Everyone who spoke shared that this project embodied all of the tenants of Rotary.

Diane ended sharing, $\hat{a}\in \infty$ Closing the books on this project but will not close the books on the friendships that have been made and the life changing work that has been done on behalf of this community. $\hat{a}\in \infty$
