-We should always remember how important Col. And Mrs. Deeds were, and are to this community. They brought much to this area and contributed in countless ways to Dayton.

-The new Carillon railroad, after some technical issues, is very popular and provides a one-mile grand circle tour of the park. It's a new experience and accessible to those who may have trouble walking and enjoying the entire park on foot.

-A new exhibit is being built over and near the railroad track which will feature information about our history in the printing and manufacturing industry of the early 19th century. Stay tuned!

-Neil's Heritage House, the former restaurant, will soon be the home of the archives, with millions of materials and items from NCR, DPL, Standard Register and other companies of Dayton history importance.

-Newcomb Tavern, Dayton's oldest standing structure, has been renovated and improved for visitors. It's a must see when you come to the park, especially the dry well that served as a jail back in the day!

-Dayton's legal history will be part of a new exhibit in the industrial block at the park.

-A large barn is being donated and literally saved from ruin. It will serve as a permanent performance and arts space in the park.

-Our sports history is huge and the Carillon team is working on some new exhibits and displays showing the important part our community played (pun-intended) in this regard.

The organization works very hard to provide visitors with the information and understanding of our contribution to history.
