JUNE 10, 2024 MESSAGE FROM THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR

Dear Fellow Rotarians:

In 2008, The Rotary Foundation adopted what was known as The Rotary Foundation Future Vision Plan and District 7630 became a pilot project District. The purpose of the project was to focus service efforts on the mission of The Rotary Foundation for greater impact and sustainability and to increase the sense of ownership at the district and club levels by transferring more decisions to the districts. The Rotary Foundation's decision to adopt the Future Vision Plan was made in part because foundation staff were so overwhelmed by the number of small grants that were being made that the staff could not keep up. Not only did The Rotary Foundation transfer the decision-making process on smaller grants to the district, however, but they also transferred the Fiduciary responsibilities associated with the making of Foundation Grants and the responsibility to see that all District Grants meet the criteria set by the Internal Revenue Code as deductible eligible grants for tax-exempt purposes.

I would like to thank the three members of the District Grants Committee who have been reviewing your final district grant reports for the last three weeks so that we can make the reimbursements promised to your Rotary Clubs. We take our fiduciary responsibility seriously. Each of these three members examines every aspect of your final report to determine that all the terms and conditions found in the Rotary Foundation Grant Policy for District Grants (which each club must agree to, to obtain a grant) have been followed. When we find an aspect of a report which we feel is insufficient, Margaret Mudron, our District Grants Chair, asks for more details or for you to expand on a specific aspect of your final report.

On Monday, June 10, 2024, our District Designated Funds Committee will meet to review your 2024-2025 District Grant applications. I would like to spend a minute on two aspects of the application which we are now investigating very deeply and at the time of the final report. The first is the competitive bidding requirement. When we are spending the amount of money needed to fund a District Grant, it is good business practice to try and buy the best product needed at the lowest price. Sometimes we must purchase a product from a supplier because there is only one vendor, but most of the time you can find more than one vendor. One example I have seen on grant applications is when a Rotary Club is going to do meal packing, they state that there is only one vendor. You should get the cost to do a meal packing from both Meals of Hope and Rise Against Hunger. Not only should you determine the best price for your project when applying for your grant, you should consider doing it again at the time the grant work is done, if the work is going to be completed in the second half of the Rotary year.

The second aspect of your grant application and final report on which the DDF committee spends considerable time is how you will let the public know about your project. My wife Beth tells everyone that she never knew anyone in Rotary until we got married fifteen months ago, nor did she have any idea how much good we did in our communities. She is always telling me that we need to "toot our own horns†more often. Putting pictures on your Club's website is important, as is posting those pictures and stories on Facebook and Linkedln, but I am not sure how often the public thinks about looking at your website, Facebook, or Linkedln pages. Those stories posted need to be reposted on all our club members' personal Facebook or Linkedln pages, so the network of viewers grows. We will require a press release prepared for every district grant project during 2024-25. We know if you live in New Castle County, the chance of the News Journal picking up the story is slim, but we know that if you live in other parts of the District like Newark, Dover, Rehoboth Beach or Ocean City, that the Newark Post, Dover Post, Cape Gazette or Ocean City Today are always looking for content. Those press releases can also be sent to local radio stations or any local print media outlets in your area. While it is also good for you to show us that the beneficiary of your district grant project also posted your activity on their website and Facebook page, that cannot be the only publicity done by club.

Finally, please join us on Sunday, June 23, 2024, when District Governor Elect Randolph C. Smith will be installed as District 7630's District Governor for the year 2024-2025. The induction ceremony will follow lunch at the Kings Creek Country Club starting at noon. Please email PDG Susan Giove at dgsusanG0910@hotmail.com to RSVP. The cost to attend the installation luncheon is \$35.00 per person and checks should be mailed to Rehoboth Beach Sunrise Rotary, P.O. Box 1301, Rehoboth Beach, DE 19971. 



2024 ROTARY DISTRICT 7630 HERO BLOOD DRIVE



ROTARY DISTRICT 7630 HERO BLOOD DRIVE IN 2024

Blood is needed daily by patients in our local hospitals. You can help! Rotary District #7630 is supporting the Blood Bank of Delmarva.

Starting January 1st and ending March 31st, 2024, 10 Rotary Clubs rolled up a sleeve and donated a total of 25 blood products for the first segment of the District 7630 Blood Drive. Two Rotary Clubs; Tidewater and Salisbury are first year participants in the campaign. We also had a 1st time donor who claimed that "the whole process was a breeze, and she will be a donor for life." With 25 blood products collected, there is a potential of 75 people in our community that will be helped. Finally, \$140 has been collected in monetary donations. I would also like to thank the Mford, Camden Wyoming and Talbot County Rotary Clubs for hosting drives in their communities in May and June. However, the work is not done. To help supply the 19 hospitals, the Blood Bank needs at least 350 donors a day.

Clubs can help in several ways:

- 1) Share the fiver at meetings and encourage Rotarians to share with family, friends and co-workers
- 2) Host a drive for the community
- 3) Collect Happy Dollars to donate to the Delmarva Blood Bank: Takes roughly \$5 for a volunteer to call a future appointment.
- 4) Donate: Several drives in the area near you.

My goal is to have 100 blood products donated by January 2025. I understand that as the weather gets warmer and summer approaches we may not have the time. To potentially help 3 people in our community, it may take 45 minutes of your time. I encourage you to roll up a sleeve and be the magic in our community.
