Cases in North Idaho. He is a former Ada County Deputy Prosecutor and high school political science teacher. He graduated from the University of Oregon School of Law.

The issues with Fentanyl are many, and most affect our youth. Trying this drug even one time can be a risk to your life. Typically a little blue circular pill, there is an "M" on one side and "30" on the other. The drug can also be distributed in blue powder form, rainbow colored powder, or even pastel colored pills so as to attract a younger age crowd with the drugs looking like candy.

The rise of Fentanyl happened as the result of the changes in opioid dispensing in 2015-17, when addiction was on the rise. The Mexican cartels began to repackage the opioid drugs by making synthetic drugs manufactured in "labs". The labs are really home made batches in buckets with unclean sanitation and no regulation. In the United States, we are familiar with pharmaceutical regulations with precise amounts of medication in each pill. One of the main problems with Fentanyl is that the drug is not equally distributed in each pill. This unregulated drug, in contrast, is 50 times more potent than heroin.

Trafficked through social media on SnapChat, TikTok, and other platforms, the target population is young teens. Most money transactions for the drugs are through online money cash apps that are encrypted so there is no "following the money". The drugs can be delivered straight to your door with drug dealers posing as DoorDash drivers.

Xanax and Adderall pills are being masked as Fentanyl and Meth. Fentanyl is also showing up as being laced into cocaine, heroin and sometimes marijuana as well. This is purposeful so drug dealers can make their product more powerful and addictive, which creates a better return rate for users. The drug is a "downer" that makes your body feel relaxed. But when the drug wears off or the person's tolerance rises, there are horrible side effects and withdrawal symptoms.
