Smith stressed that KH is an independent, not for profit 501(c)3, and locally governed. It has 1,000 providers, 4,200 employees and 445 beds, including Clearwater Valley and St Maries, which are part of the KH system. Operating revenue is \$94M.

Smith has expanded the KH board from 9 to 11. There is also a corporate member board (on which Heidi Rogers and Sue Thilo sit), as well as a Foundation board.

A key focus for Smith is workforce stabilization. During the pandemic Kootenai Health had 800 open positions. That number is now down to under 200, through a lot of work and wage increases. Traveling positions are luring away full time employees due to their comparatively high salaries.

Another focus is expanding to become a regional hospital, drawing from Spokane Valley, Western Montana, and southern Idaho. Currently 30% of patients come from outside of Kootenai County. KH relies on physician referrals for this growth, and regional transfers are up in areas such as NICU, cardiovascular, and neurosurgery. KH doesn't do transplants because they are low volume and high risk.

Here are stats on other health systems in our region:

Sacred Heart 691 beds, 3,523 employees

Deaconess 388 beds, 1,400 employees

Kootenai Health 397 beds, 3,595 employees*

The reason why the number of employees at KH is so high is because it is the "corporate headquarters†and so has IT, finance, HR, and more support staff.

One measure of KH's success is its Google 4.5 rating from over 5,000 people. This indicates strong community support. In contrast, Deaconess rates 2.6, Sacred Heart 3.1, Bozeman Health 2.7.

Challenges faced by KH include:

- Medicaid disenrollment changed patients to charity care
- Inflation exceeds insurance reimbursement
- Large percentage of patients are Medicare, which $\text{doesn} \widehat{a} \in {}^{\text{\tiny TM}} t$ reimburse enough
- Workforce shortage, especially for nurses, radiologists and lab techs
