PROGRAM

As many know, Tubbs Hill is a gem in our community. David Taylor and George Sayler spoke with the club about the history of the land and how it continues to be an asset to our community and visitors alike.

Taylor is a Post Falls and University of Idaho graduate. In 2001, he returned to the area and is an avid Tubbs Hill walker and serves with the Tubbs Hill Foundation. Sayler is graduate of the University of Montana, an Army veteran, and began teaching History and Government at CDA High School in 1973 until he retired three decades later . In 2002, he began eight years of service as a state representative. Sayler has been a part of the Tubbs Hill Foundation for 16 years.

Tubbs Hill encompasses 130 acres of natural beauty. There are four miles of trails and 400 feet of elevation gain to the top at 2,533 ft, and 143 plant and 87 mammal species make their home on the hill. The history of Tubbs Hill was recorded in the book, $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{C}A$ Treasure Called Tubbs Hill $\hat{a} \in$, written by the late Scott Reed, a long-time community member and advocate for Tubbs Hill. Purchased for \$300,005, the land became public in 1969, and in 1985 the Tubbs Hill Foundation was formed. The 20 member board of the Foundation is charged with the mission to preserve Tubbs Hill City Park as a unique and natural lakeshore forest, and to keep it open and available for public use. Everything the Foundation undertakes is in conjunction with the City of CDA Parks Department.

Current projects include maintaining forest health, managing invasive tree and plant species, trail rehabilitation or reroute to avoid land erosion, and twice yearly trash cleanup. Unauthorized trails are a large issue as it leads to erosion and potential sediment entering the lake. If interested in volunteering, trail work is typically conducted in the spring, with trash cleanup on July 5 and in the fall during October.
