o "Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th of November next to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and

glorious Being who is the beneficent author of the good that was, that is, or that will be." (1789)

- George Washington. The proclamation is considered the first presidential proclamation.
- President Abraham Lincoln's proclamation in 1863 established Thanksgiving as a yearly holiday on the last Thursday of November.
- On December 26, 1941, President Roosevelt signed a joint resolution of Congress changing the official national Thanksgiving Day to the fourth Thursday in November, starting in 1942.

A "bracing" (Vox) guide for surviving and resisting America's turn towards authoritarianism, from "a rising public intellectual unafraid to make bold connections between past and present." (New York Times.) The Founding Fathers tried to protect us from the threat they knew, the tyranny that overcame ancient democracy. Today, our political order faces new threats, not unlike the totalitarianism of the twentieth century. We are no wiser than the Europeans who saw democracy yield to fascism, Nazism, or communism. Our one advantage is that we might learn from their experience.

PROGRAM

Zeke Guzman, who grew up in Dry Creek Valley and graduated from HHS, spoke about the Jardin del Pueblo, or People's Garden, whose logo features an old Mexican farm cart of his family. Over 150 families volunteer on weekends on the property, on Los Amigos Rd, and their motto is "We know hunger. We want to feed the community." The farm raises enormous amounts of fruit and vegetables,



all of which go to an array of local community-serving organizations, such as Redwood Empire Food bank, Healdsburg Pantry, Corazon, etc. Local schools are involved as well. Many children work the gardens; they are taught to respect the land and grow food. Rotary's recent donation of \$5000 has purchased an equipment trailer, which will facilitate moving farm machinery between the farm properties.



Bruce Metzer, talked about Farm To Fight Hunger, with its motto, Grow Gather Give. In addition to supporting Jardin del Pueblo, they grow enormous amount of produce given to the community, predominantly to the Latino community, since they have the greatest needs. They farm organically and sustainably, and encourage biodiversity, utilizing hedgerows, bees, compost, etc., earning a Snail designation from Slow

Food. Their 150 chickens provide eggs for the REFB and the Hgb Food Pantry, while

gleaners provide vegetables to the same orgs and to schools. They are currently expanding to another property and will be adding many vegetable beds & citrus trees.
