BOOK REVIEW –



Barbara Rosen gave an enthusiastic review of "Orbital", a novel by Samantha Harvey and winner of the 2024 Booker Prize for fiction. The book is a snapshot of one day in the lives of six women and men traveling through space, on one of the last space station missions of its kind before the program is dismantled. The astronauts and cosmonauts—from America, Russia, Italy,

Britain, and Japan—have left their lives behind to travel in space as the earth reels below. The book covers their earthly lives in brief communications with family, their photos and talismans; while living a weightless existence in space and forming bonds through their experiences.

- Norm, Eric Drew and Graham Beal visited the Hansen Gravel Pit restoration site with Russian Riverkeeper. The large gravel pits, created over a century, have altered the flow of the river and the migration of Steelhead and other fish. Russian Riverkeeper is undertaking a multi-year project to restore the normal flow of the river and replace lost native plants along the shore.

David Moreland Craft Talk



Dave, though new to our club, is a longtime Rotarian from St. Helena. Born in Canada, **Dave** grew up in Arizona, where his family moved when he was only a baby. When he made it into the Naval Academy, **Dave** had to become a U.S. Citizen. He met his wife Leslie on a blind date while on leave. They have now been married 52 years. A wise woman, Leslie steered **Dave** away from flight school (10-year service commitment), SEALS or explosives (for

obvious reasons) and he served on Navy Destroyers, with a home base in Greece. **Dave** describes his Naval career as "chasing Russians" around the Mediterranean.

Discharged in San Diego, **Dave** applied his engineering and MBA degrees in various ventures until they were ready to sell their home and "retire" up in St. Helena. Since then, **Dave** has accumulated lots of experience and tax losses in being a rancher of cows and horses, later shifting to growing almonds and raising bees. Still an active entrepreneur, **Dave** is involved in deploying solar energy systems and solar-powered electric car charging stations in Napa County. **Dave** and Leslie have moved into Enso Village, where he also applies his skills in helping the many things that "still need fixing" at the newest retirement center in town. **Dave** reports the food at Enso is good, but Leslie is a better cook, so he is a bit spoiled in that regard.
