Thank you: Clair R gave an award to our Rotary Club and our past president Sue A for our participation in Clair's chosen charity, the End Polio Now campaign, for her 2023 - 2024 year as District Governor.

John S spoke to us about his trip to Jamaica to provide dentures to 17 people who had not had teeth for years. (51 people showed up.) He thanked us for our part in a \$5,000 donation which made this possible. He plans to go back again next year.

John R reported that the gala made about \$67,000 or \$68,000, a little better than last year. The volunteers were efficient and the checkout smooth. He then reported that we are doing the See's candy sale. We will be selling 11-23, 11-30, 12-7, 12-14, 12-21 and also 12-4 at Waterford. There will be sign-up sheets for volunteers at our next general meeting.

Lamorinda Sunrise members told us about their Car with a Cause fundraiser, and offered us \$100 tickets (only 600 tickets to be sold) to bid on the car. The car was outside so we could see it.

PROGRAM

Our speaker Gary Parker was unable to appear, but Richard NIcoli was able to speak to us instead. Richard was introduced by Elliot B, who first gave us with some lovely thoughts about sharing the beauty surrounding us and being stewards of the land.

Richard Nicoli is a docent with the Mt. Diablo Interpretive Center. He is a volunteer, as are all those who work with the Center. His background was business manager of a unified school district. He told us about the Mt. Diablo State Park, home to Native Americans for 10,000 years.

The Interpretative Center is in Mitchell Canyon, in the Park. From there you can hike to the summit of Mt. Diablo, about two miles round trip. It is a tough hike, but doable. Mitchel Canyon is a very popular public space. It has waterfalls (especially after rain), wildflowers, birds, butterflys, even tarantula exhibits, hiking, picnicking, and lots of parking.

But right now, there is only a 20-year-old trailer being used as a visiting center. The Center wants a permanent, state of the art Center, with indoor and outdoor spaces, and has taken steps in that direction. They have architects and a Master Plan for the whole site, accessible for the disabled. The Center is planned to be nearly fireproof, made of stone with steel roofs, and, to save birds from flying into the glass, there are some bubbles in the glass which alert the birds.

The current road to the Center is not suitable for school buses, so parents have to drive their children to the Center. The disadvantaged can't take the time from work, or have transportation, so now the Center mostly serves the affluent. There is \$10,000 a year planned to pay for transportation for all children to the Center.

Overall 4.5 million dollars is needed. The Center has raised nearly that amount, but needs more donations. Many Rotarys in the area have helped. Some Rotary clubs are making joint contributions. Richard asks us to spread the word – <u>www.MDIA.org</u> – and perhaps donate. The hoped-for start of the new Center is 2026.

The meeting adjourned at 1:30 p.m.
