#### Program: John Bateson - the Golden Gate Bridge Suicide Deterrent Barrier

John Bateson was the executive director of the Contra Costa Crisis Center for 16 years, and also has been the executive director for three university-run counseling centers. He served on the steering committee of the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline (now known as 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline) and was appointed to a committee that created the California Strategic Plan on Suicide Prevention. He spoke to Rotary about the suicide prevention net on the Golden Gate Bridge, which was installed in February, 2024.

When John Bateson was the executive director of the Contra Costa Crisis Center, he learned in his first few days that every painting that included the Golden Gate Bridge was removed because of the impact of these paintings on the staff because of the painful memories of the suicides. He was inspired to learn more and write the books.

- The original bridge net was \$120,000 (\$2 million today) to string it the length of the bridge
- Death toll is 2,000 plus people. To demonstrate this number, there is a picture of the shoes for those who died.
- Demographics:
  - o 75% male, 25% female
  - o Most under 40 years of age
  - Students are #1 and teachers #2
- Why so many deaths:
  - Magnetic appeal of the bridge
  - Mistaken belief that this would be a quick and relatively painless death (actually most die of drowning which is painful.)
  - Access is relatively easy
  - o Railing is so low only 4 feet and easy to get over
- Arguments against a barrier and counter-arguments:
  - Cost (spent \$5 million on bicycle lane and \$30 million on a median without a similar loss of lives)
  - Aesthetics (Block Street Bridge in Toronto erected in 2003 was designed to prevent all suicides and still looks good)
  - Effectiveness (most effective is raising the railing)
- Harvard Study:
  - Most of those who attempt suicide do not die from suicide (only 4-10%)
  - 38 people who survived attempts regretted it immediately and most said they did not have a "plan B"
- The impact of these individuals who attempt and commit suicide adversely impacts witnesses and first responders; some children are thrown overboard before a parent jumps.
- Current Net quite rigid and 20 feet below the roadway and has been effective, reducing suicides that ranged from 30-45 a year to only 8 in 2024 (hoping to get to 0 in 2025)
  - Build Rail Foundation is a volunteer nonprofit organization and advocate for the nets and is looking into other spots to build preventative structures.


