

## Speaker for the Day - Leon Panetta

Military Intelligence officer.

Past President David Stein commenced his introduction by noting Secretary Panetta is a man of unwavering character and faith who has led a life committed to public service. Born in Monterey, California, the son Italian immigrants, Secretary Panetta learned service at a young age. In high school he was student body president and in the Key club. In college he served in the ROTC. After graduating from law school, he served as an Army

Secretary Panetta grew up in California during an age of Republican Leadership that was fiscally conservative, yet socially progressive. After leaving the military he landed a job as a legislative assistant to Republican Senator Thomas Kuchel, who warned him about DC and politics: "Remember, when you get up in the morning you have to look yourself in the mirror." He has never forgotten that.

He served in the <u>Nixon administration</u> as director of the <u>Office for Civil Rights</u>, where he chose to enforce <u>civil rights</u> and equal-education laws over

substantial political pressure. This resulted is his being forced to resign. In 1971 he became a Democrat and was elected to Congress five years later. Serving the Monterey area for 16 years, he concentrated on budget issues, civil rights, education, healthcare, agriculture, immigration, and environmental protection.

As Director of the Office of Management and Budget under President Bill Clinton, he developed the budget package that would eventually result in the 1998 balanced budget. He was President Clinton's White House chief of staff from 1994 to 1997. President Barack Obama called on Secretary Panetta to serve, first as the director of the CIA, where he played a key role in the raid that killed Osama bin Laden and then as secretary of defense, where he jointly certified, along with the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, that the military was prepared to repeal "Don't Ask, Don't Tell,"

Since retiring as secretary of defense in 2013, Secretary Panetta has served as chairman of the Panetta Institute for Public Policy, which he co-founded with his wife in 1997. The nonpartisan Institute works to help communities, and our country meet the challenges of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, with a particular focus of attracting thoughtful young men and women to lives of public service.

Long an advocate for the world's oceans, he cochairs the Joint Ocean Commission Initiative. He is a member Council for Responsible Social Media to address the negative mental, civic, and public health impacts of social media.

Secretary Panetta is married to Sylvia. They have three sons and six grandchildren. In 2016, their third son, <u>Jimmy Panetta</u>, was elected to his old congressional seat. When Secretary Panetta and Sylvia became engaged, she gave him a watch. He has worn it ever since, always set to California time, so that no matter where he is in the world he is always reminded of home.

**David** said we are honored to have Secretary Panetta here today to speak to Oakland Rotary on the topic: The Challenge of Leadership – Finding Opportunity in Crisis.

### Leon Panetta's Remarks

Secretary Leon Panetta's family has a history in Oakland and family members still live here. His son, Jimmy Panetta served in Alameda in the district's attorney's office, as did his wife, Carrie, who became a Superior Court Judge in Monterey.

His father was the 13th child from a family in Italy. His father's older brother located in Wyoming and his father's other brother settled in Monterey. After a frigid winter in Wyoming, his father and mother decided to visit the brother who was in Monterey. His family owned a restaurant, and he recalls standing on a chair to wash dishes at a very young age. Later, his father bought

land in Carmel and raised walnuts. Secretary Panetta and his wife still own the farm and now have a vineyard. He related a funny story about his father, telling him that when he went to Washington, D.C., he would be well prepared because he spent his youth dodging nuts. Secretary Panetta asked his father why he came to America from Italy; it was because he wanted to give his children a better life than he had.

He reflected on his time in the U.S. House of Representatives reaching across the aisle on bipartisan issues with leaders like George Schultz and Rahm Emanuel. And despite politics, people were able to come to consensus on important issues like immigration, passing Social Security legislation and balancing the budget as OMB director.

He noted that we are in challenging times and that chaos and unpredictability appear to be the order of the day, but this could be alleviated with strong leadership and strong alliances with our allies. He is hopeful the president will provide leadership in the crises that we face. There have recently been a record number of executive orders, but executive orders are not government. The only way to govern is through changing laws. From his viewpoint, America faces two alternatives: there could be a renaissance, or we could see an America in decline. There are positives; economic fundamentals are strong and there is new technology so we can teach 21st century skills to young people. Democrats and Republicans need to work together.

Immigration crisis can be solved not through deportation, but rather through legal and legitimate ways to come into this country to work and provide a better future for their families.

A globalized economy needs free and fair trade, which is important for all countries to economically thrive. Tariffs and trade wars are counterproductive. He learned from his experience with OMB that the budget can be balanced.


He also spoke about the necessity to maintain a strong military and a strong NATO so that autocrats who are working together will not destroy our democracy. Building strong alliances with our allies will allow us to prevent Putin from further incursions into the Ukraine.

Despite the many challenges this country faces, he sees opportunities in chaos that and reminded us of Abraham Lincoln's quote, that we attend to the better angels of our natures. As a community, we need to fight so that we have the right leadership in this country.

Secretary Panetta hopes we do not withdraw from the World Health Organization or NATO because isolationism does not work. He entertained questions and remarked that he believes all young people should engage in two years of national service upon graduating from high

school. It does not necessarily need to be in the military. It could be in healthcare or conservation. They would be paid for that service to begin their college career instead of going into incredible debt.

Secretary Panetta received a standing ovation and **President Shannon** announced a donation will be made in his name to End Polio Now and thanked him for his inspirational speech.
