BRYAN WONG

Habitat for Humanity and Pasadena: Housing for the Future

Since April 2021, Bryan Wong has been leading an amazing team of 50+ individuals in the mission of building homes, community and hope right here in the San Gabriel Valley. Prior to his role with SGV Habitat, the Cal Poly Pomona graduate founded his own affordable housing nonprofit, The American Homeownership Foundation, which managed affordable multi-family housing for the elderly. Wong served on the board of directors for Los Angeles Nation Bank for 10 years and was elected to the Monrovia Unified School District Board of Education, serving for over 16 years. These activities highlight two of his greatest passions, education and homeownership. Wong resides in Monrovia and enjoys playing golf, watching any sporting event live and traveling.

The idea for SGV Habitat for Humanity began in 1989. Approximately 40 people attended a meeting to discuss the idea of bringing Habitat for Humanity to Pasadena and

to encourage participation in an upcoming big event. The event was a walk from Pasadena to Tijuana. 75 walkers ended up making the trek from Pasadena to Tijuana where 100 houses were built in one week.

Following the success of this effort, SGV Habitat's founders entered into a covenant with Habitat for Humanity International and in 1990 a new Habitat affiliate in the San Gabriel Valley and northeast Los Angeles County was created. In 1990 the median home price for LA County was \$212,85 and in that same year, SGV Habitat built their first home, which was in Pasadena.

Simply Stephen Smith's Spokes Speaks

Rotary's help in Turkey's Earthquake in 2023

Turkey is known for its deadly earthquakes. The country sits at the junction of three major tectonic plates, with a fourth, smaller one squeezed between the others. On February 6th of 2023, a 7.8 magnitude quake hit the epicenter, near Kahramanmaras, which was the strongest quake to hit the country in more than 80 years. Nine hours later, a 2nd quake with a 7.5 magnitude struck the city again. Between Turkey and Syria, the quakes left more than 50,000 people dead, over 100,000 injured and several millions homeless. Up to 9.1 million people were affected, nearly the population of Los Angeles County.

After the first quake the Governor of District 2430, Emre Ozturk and two other Turkish Governors mounted a response. A three-pronged plan would grow into a multimillion dollar global relief effort: fulfilling immediate emergency relief needs; providing shelter in the form of container cities; and meeting the long-term needs for everything from water treatment to children's education.

Rotary clubs in other parts of the country also assisted. Rotary, Rotaract, and Interact sent more than 200 trucks of emergency supplies, including food and water, generators, heaters, diapers, fuel and body bags. District 2440 had an existing supply of tents and established a tent city in Iskenderun, on the Mediterranean coast, that Rotary members administered for more than a month before the country disaster agency took over. Rotary was the first NGO (non governmental organization) that was present in the region. Rotary clubs worked with ShelterBox, Rotary's project partner in disaster relief, to distribute over 2,500 tents.

Funds from Rotary members in Japan paid to build a new school from the ground up. Adiyaman became the location of four container cities that Rotary members supported. In total, donations from Rotary members supplied 350 prefabricated small homes. Rotary's field hospital has been

operational since April of 2023 and serves about 200 patients a day. It has its own generator, ambulance, monitoring and ultrasound devices, a blood testing lab and a shower that doctors can use between shifts. The health system collapsed temporarily but Rotary health care workers from China to Sweden stepped up as well.

It is with great pride that I can call myself and others in our club and District, Rotarians.



Special thanks to **PP Justene Adamec**, who pledged \$170 in honor of the 17 people who showed up to walk, event co-chair **Morgan Nadeau**, who showed up with a bunch of her friends, and **Anthony Russo**, who brought along a bunch of his fellow Pasadena Police Dept motorcycle officers to escort our walkers/runners. **Dean** noted that we are on track to have fewer worldwide cases of polio this year than last year – let's keep working to stamp it out once and for all!

Mary Lou Byrne made a Polio Pig donation of \$170 to match PP Justene's contribution to the World Polio Day event and thanked everybody who made the event such a success. She then made a poignant plea for referrals for a "tech person" to help her and husband **Gary Kearney** with some pesky computer/TV issues at Chateau Kearney.

Tammy Silver introduced the speaker, our own Marsha Rood, who she called "the savior of Pasadena" for her work in resisting the demolition of our beautiful historic buildings in favor of "shiny glass boxes."

Marsha's topic was the redevelopment of Old Town Pasadena, and she began by noting that what made it special is how many people were responsible. She singled out Claire Bogaard, who was present, as a key player. She also recognized Marilyn and Gene Buchanan, then-City Manager Phil Hawkey, and Erlinda Romo, all of whom were seated at Marsha's table and all of whom stood for a rousing round of applause.

Marsha showed us photos of Old Town from the 1980s, and then current photos. What a difference! "How," she asked, "did this [old] place become this [new] place?" (Ed. note: You can see some fun historic photos here: https://www.oldpasadena.org/about/history-of-old-pasadena/.) She explained that the redevelopment model at the time (1970s-early 1980s) was to use eminent domain to assemble large parcels to build huge office and retail developments, such as the original Plaza Pasadena. She characterized those developments as "buildings that turned their backs on the area and tried to make Pasadena look like the suburbs."

Left in the wake of this strategy was Old Pasadena, with a vacancy rate of 80% and a bad reputation for crime and general seediness. But, said **Marsha**, "when you focus on place, everything changes." The pioneers including Marsha and her colleagues in the room had a vision to preserve the historic buildings along Colorado Blvd. and beyond. The key, it turned out, was public parking, beginning with the facility at Fair Oaks and Union. Once the community embraced the vision, it became city policy and the City of Pasadena re-invented redevelopment to fit the needs and vision.



invested in infrastructure, going from the project-based model to the place-based model. Once the City invested in public projects like parking, private developers began doing private projects, which was unprecedented. Marsha explained that once the parking was actually under construction, banks started making loans for those private projects.

Another innovation was using parking meter revenue to improve the area. It was brand new at the time, but it's now called "return to source" and is taught in urban planning textbooks! Again, **Marsha** emphasized that "we wanted the place, not the improvements, to be the focus." Targeted retail recruitment attracted substantial private investment, and the Gold Line stations and additional housing attracted still more investment.

The result? Marsha put up a slide showing Old Pasadena By the Numbers, 2024:

\$900,000,000 plus in private investment

\$30,000,000 in public improvements

\$375,000,000 in annual sales volume

\$96-180 per square foot rents on Colorado Blvd.

\$50-60 per square foot rents off the Blvd.

150-plus historic buildings seismically reinforced to date

330 businesses, of which 85% are independent and only 15% are chains (thus debunking the idea that chains forced out small businesses)

4,000 new housing units in and adjacent to Old Pasadena

40,000 plus visitors every weekend

After sharing these numbers, **Marsha** proudly shared the numerous awards that Old Pasadena has won from various urban planning and other organizations. She ended her presentation by again recognizing "the pioneers who made the impossible happen."

During the Q and A, **Marsha** was asked whether she was worried about competition from the likes of Rick Caruso and his popular shopping malls. She responded "Our deal is authenticity of place. Hetrogeniety is what works, as long as we can keep it!"

At the end of more lively Q and As, **President Stephen** presented Marsha with her speaker gift and we all departed, chattering excitedly about what we'd learned about our city.

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
