Club presidents, I recognize that the distribution is the same day and time as the virtual President's Advance, and that many you will be eager to roll up your sleeves to help, but I hope you'll take this opportunity to meet together and recharge your "presidential battery," instead. There will be many more chances to lend a hand in the weeks and months ahead, so I hope to see you at the Advance.

There's some good news on the fundraising front. Many of you are familiar with ShelterBox USA. They have been long-standing partners with Rotary, and I'm happy to announce they have created a matching fund for the benefit of the wildfire victims in our district and in neighboring district 5280. Gifts will be matched up to \$100,000! This means our districts will have \$200,000 to help victims with long-term recovery, *if we can meet the goal*. District 5300 California Wildfire Disaster Relief Grants

District 5300 has created a fund to assist those impacted by the California wildfires. We will distribute the funds in phases. In Phase 1 the District has allocated \$40,000 to District grant funds to distribute to clubs that develop a project assisting people impacted by the devastation of the fires. The District 5300 California Wildfire Disaster Relief Grants are a one-time special infusion of grant funds from the donations of District 5300 Rotarians and others to the District 5300 Foundation to fund smaller, short-term activities that specifically address the needs of first responders and those impacted by the 2025 Southern California fires.

Guidelines for Applications

- 1. Preference will be given to applications of clubs who collaborate with local non-profits (i.e. St. Vincent de Paul, food banks, etc.) to support those impacted.
- 2. Align with the <u>Terms and Conditions for Rotary Foundation Disaster Response Grants</u>.
- 3. Grant requests should not exceed \$2,500.
- 4. Clubs may distribute funds only to non-Rotarians.

Clubs will receive grant funds via check in U.S. mail after the District Grants Committee approves the grant application.

How much is available for District 5300 California Wildfire Disaster Relief Grants?

The total District 5300 California Wildfire Disaster Relief Grant Funds immediately available to District 5300 is approximately \$40,000 and Clubs may request up to \$2,500. We anticipate more funding to be available in the weeks to come and will notify clubs.

How do clubs qualify and apply for District Grant funds?

To qualify clubs must:

- 1. Attend zoom meeting on Feb. 6 at 5pm or have two members with District training for District Grants
- 2. Submit a "round 3" application by February 15, 2025. If funds are available, we will review applications after this deadline.

4. Have the person completing the final report for the club's grants attend final report training. Clubs that do not submit final reports within 30 days of receiving funding from the District will not be eliqible for future funding.

In today's complex world, where youth face increasing mental health struggles, this contest provides an opportunity for self-reflection and problem-solving. According to reports, "Mental health challenges in children, adolescents, and young adults are real and widespread. An alarming number of young people struggle with feelings of helplessness, depression, and thoughts of suicide — and rates have increased over the past decade." Initiatives like this encourage personal growth, reminding students they have the strength to navigate life's complexities.

Parents and educators play a crucial role in this journey. As the saying goes, "Parents must let go to let them grow." Supporting participation in programs like the Ethics Essay Contest helps guide students toward independence, ethical decision-making, and resilience.

The District contest rewards: the Grand Prize winner receives \$2,000, their teacher \$500. The 1st and 2nd Runners-Up earn \$500, their teachers receive \$100.

Would you like to change Rotary? You can, Here's how:

Rotary International may have one of the most democratic legislative system of any organization. It is a little clumsy and expensive, but very effective. Any Rotarian in the world can propose a change in how Rotary International operates and propose any part of the constitution or bylaws. The legislative body is called the Council on Legislation (COL). It meets every three years and is made up of one representative from all 500+ districts in the world. This three-year term our representative is John Chase. John's role is to share the potential enactments that could change how Rotary International functions, discuss them with anyone interested, and vote them up or down.

An enactment is created, first, by anyone that has an idea that may make the management of Rotary International more effective. They simply need to convince their club, and have their district vote on the idea. If a simple majority in the district votes positively, it may be considered by the COL. A positive vote by the COL is an automatic change in Rotary operations, two thirds for a RI constitutional change, simple majority for bylaws or club constitution change.

The COL will meet in Chicago, April 13-18, 2025 where 86 proposed enactments will be debated and votes will be made. The proposed enactments are listed on the Rotary.org website and you are encouraged to read and share your thoughts.
