Altadena Rotary Club Gives from the Heart, with a lot of help from its friends

Since the Eaton Fire of January 7, the Altadena Rotary Club has been focused on taking care of its neighbors throughout the community of Altadena. It is important to remember that 17 lives were lost and 6,018 single family homes destroyed with another 1,020 damaged. Also, another 3,000 structures including commercial businesses were damaged or destroyed. The scale of devastation is truly beyond belief. More than 20 Rotarians in District 5300 lost homes. A few dozen more were out of their homes for weeks, some still are because of wind or smoke damage.

Our club has become one of the principal non-government organizations in the area providing for

needs for those displaced by the fire. Inasmuch as nearly half the club members no longer have homes, we have a fairly good idea of survivors' needs. So the club conducted a community "Give Event" in February; we learned a lot from that experience. We decided to do a second one on Saturday, March 15.

Our March "Day of Service for Eaton Fire Survivors" was a team effort with support and donations from Rotarians all across D5300. Over six tons of goods, clothing, and supplies warehoused at the Los Angeles County Fairgrounds and another storage facility in Pomona were transported to the Altadena Grocery Outlet. Altadena Rotarians Jose and Sandra Valenzuela who operate the store generously made their facility and parking lot the center of gravity for all items given away.

ShelterBox USA (Rotary International's only Project Partner in disaster relief) provided 10 tons of air purifiers. We provided air purifiers, blankets, water, and perishable food in our "drive through" distribution area. We had new shoes and clothing, non-perishable food, cases of water, blankets and many more items in our pedestrian "free shop" area. Blue Tape Ministry made over 750 burritos at their portable kitchen on site.

We had donations and help from Altadena Town Council, Altadena Rotary, Glendora Rotary, Altadena Grocery Outlet, Pasadena Federal Credit Union, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Volunteer Team, St. Vincent de Paul, several Rotary District 5300 clubs, Los Angeles County Library, Altadena Library, and Blue Tape Ministry.

To give an idea of the magnitude of the effort, over 700 pre-registered families from the Altadena Community (we checked identification on site) received assistance at our drive through and many more also arrived later for the "free shop". 77 Rotarians (including three Youth Exchange students) from 18 Rotary clubs participated in volunteering at the event which ran from 7AM to about 3PM.

Representatives from FEMA and Small Business Administration (SBA) were also there. They have

been on site through this entire recovery effort. And because each organization had its crew, the effort was tremendous and involved over 100 volunteers. In addition, as before, the US Army Corps of Engineers had its Emergency Operations Center on site and an information booth to provide support. Some of the folks there pitched in to help us with distributing items. So we say "Hooah!" to our Army Corps.

With all of that, we were able to serve so many folks in need. This was only possible because Rotarians and others traveled to Altadena to help our community. We are so grateful for your Service above Self. On behalf of the Rotary Club of Altadena and our fellow citizens, thank you D5300 Rotarians and all of you friends of Rotary and Altadena!

The Rotary Foundation - You Make The Difference

Global Grant-Funded Ambulance in Cavite, Philippines

(Operations Support/Rotary Action Group-Community Economic Development) and Rotarians from the Rotary Club Cavite Centro visited with the staff of General Trias Medicare Hospital in General Trias City, Cavite, Philippines. This hospital was the recipient of a Rotary International Global Grant approved in March 2024 to purchase an ambulance. The one existing ambulance could not meet the demand for emergency and patient care response. With the purchase of the new ambulance, the hospital not only serves the emergency response needs of the people in the General Trias City but also of the people in the neighboring towns.

The Rotary Club of Cavite Centro is working on a second global grant to fund a mobile medical clinic to service the medical needs of the city and its surrounding towns.

Thanks are due to Ian Finlay for securing free luggage for all of the duffel bags loaded with our supplies and materials. San Juan La Laguna was one of the villages on the lake that we traveled to and went to not only schools but medical clinics. We also traveled to libraries and feed stores to donate veterinary medicine books in Spanish so people can learn about ailments that might be present with their animals. We collaborated with Kiwanis member, Reyna Diaz, to find people who needed the most help.

A variety of indigenous people live in the highlands we visited. We worked with a local administrator to determine what families needed food (rice, oil, flour, vegetables, etc.) and how we could best get it to them. We supplied over 50 families with food baskets.

We do this humanitarian aid trip to demonstrate that we are all brothers and sisters in this world – and whatever we can do to lighten the burdens of others is good to do and in keeping with the Four-Way Test.

We will start collecting items for the 2026 trip in the near future. Thanks to so many that have made this type of giving possible –bringing smiles to the faces of people around the world.



Las Vegas Rotary Donates \$25,000 to Spread the Word Nevada

For more than a decade, the Las Vegas Rotary Club has been committed to empowering young readers and fostering a love of learning. We believe literacy is the foundation of success, and we are proud to continue our support of Spread the Word Nevada's important work.

In the 2023-24 fiscal year, the Las Vegas Rotary Club donated a total of \$271,000 to local and international organizations, in addition to its Santa Clothes program which raised \$120,569. The club's priorities for giving include initiatives that support food insecurity, youth education and community service. Last year's donations included funding for food insecurity relief efforts, grants to 501(c)(3) community service organizations, UNLV scholarships, local elementary schools, youth literacy initiatives and various youth programs such as TLC, RYLA, Dan Stover Music Competition and the 4-Way Speech Contest.

Las Vegas Southwest-Sponsored Interact Club Children's Hospital Project

The Interactors will be coordinating volunteers, raising funds, decorating rooms, restocking the Nourishment Center, running craft stations, drawing caricatures, room design and decorations.

Their goal was to raise sufficient funds to decorate three rooms at a cost of \$525 each. Following their very informative presentation (click here), Southwest Rotarians pledged enough money to completely cover the cost of their project. Our club was happy to present them with a check for \$1,605.

She recently provided an update for her sponsor, Fred Findley of the Pasadena Club. It provides a good idea of how life changing such an experience can be.

Dear Mr. Findley,

I'm happy to share that my experience as a Global Grant Scholar in the Master of Legal Studies program at the University of Auckland has been incredibly fulfilling so far. My research is progressing very well, and I've been actively involved in the university community through the Women in Law club, where I serve as the Advocacy and Intersectionality Officer.

Just last night, we hosted our first book club event, which drew over 60 attendees. I had the honor of moderating a powerful discussion with the author, a prominent feminist legal scholar in New Zealand whose work focuses on intimate partner violence. In addition to our advocacy initiatives, me and my co-officer have launched a weekly 7am run club that has helped foster a strong sense of community among law students.

On the Rotary front, I recently had the privilege of serving as a keynote speaker at the Rotary Club of Pukekohe—an incredible experience. I've also been invited to speak at the Rotary Club of Auckland Harbourside this coming May. Most recently, I've taken over the social media and marketing responsibilities for my host club, the Rotary Club of Manukau Sunrise. I have been working closely with members to strengthen their digital presence and engagement.

Wen Chen, an Engaging Speaker

Wen Chen, PHD, is a resident of Pasadena and a scientist at Caltech. She can speak on many topics and is a wonderful speaker/guest. She spoke at LV WON and was quite engaging.

Dr. Wen Chen was born in China during the Great Cultural Revolution. Wen's parents were victims of this horrific atrocity that killed two million intellectuals and destroyed traditional Chinese culture. Though her parents worried that her education could cause her to be targeted for persecution by the Party, Wen excelled in academics and won a national prize at a science competition when she was 16. She was thus accepted into a top university for undergraduate studies. In 1994, Wen came to the U.S. for graduate school and received a doctorate in Biology at the California Institute of Technology in 2000. She has been working as a staff scientist for Caltech since 2000 as a biologist and information scientist.

Living in the US as a scientific researcher opened her eyes to how she had been brainwashed all her life by the Communist Party in China. So, she decided to become a voice for the voiceless. Since 2012, she has given hundreds of presentations to community organizations about Chinese culture, history, and



human rights. She has crafted over ten topics for Rotary clubs and her workplace. Her popular topics include "Human Rights Movement in China", "Chinese Medicine and Meditation", "China's Global Impact", "History of Tea", "Human Rights of Women & Girls in China", "North Korea and China", and "Coronavirus and Chinese Censorship". 
