Global Grant Scholar

The following comes from the Altadena Club, presenting Zia Saylor, one of four Global Grant scholars, who was a recent speaker. She is currently studying abroad and shared the impact the experience is having on her life and the world!

Zia's Global Grant Scholarship was sponsored by the Altadena Rotary Club for the 2024-2026 academic years. She is currently pursuing her PhD in Social

Policy from the University of Bristol in the United Kingdom. Her research focuses on anti-poverty policy, specifically within South Africa, marking a continuation of research she has conducted and published since her undergraduate years at Williams College. She received her Master of Science in

Public Policy through a Fulbright Scholarship (also for the University of Bristol) and hopes to use her education to improve the research on and policies around improving access to opportunities for others, particularly along gendered lines of inequality.

For her PhD work, the University of Bristol has awarded her a full-tuition scholarship over the next two years. The Global Grant Scholarship, \$31,000, is paying for her living expenses (housing, food, local transportation), travel, miscellaneous school-related expenses and miscellaneous personal expenses.

She has worked in policy engagement in California, Indiana, and Massachusetts in addition to her international research. She attended elementary and high school in Pasadena and when not at the university, still lives at home in Pasadena with her mom, Dora. In her free time, she enjoys hiking with her border collies in Eaton Canyon and reading.

LV Southwest: Chet Buchanan's Remarkable Toy Drive

At a recent meeting, our speaker was Chet Buchanan, host and creator of his eponymous radio show. He is also the brains behind the annual Chet Buchanan Show Toy Drive, where, for the past 25 years, he lives and broadcasts live on top of a 30-foot scaffolding for 12 days straight to raise toys for thousands of Las Vegas children. Each year, from approximately December 5 through December 16, this iconic radio personality ascends his 30-foot scaffold to collect donations for HELP of Southern Nevada. The end of this year's drive marked 205 days of living on the scaffolding for Chet, totaling over six months.



This year he was able to fill 42 Coca-Cola trucks full of toys, 7,774 bikes and over \$802,000 donated in cash and gift cards, including a \$255,000 donation from one local business. These contributions are distributed to over 100 nonprofit organizations throughout the Las Vegas community.

After the meeting, where he presented a lively account of the many demonstrations of selflessness and compassion from the citizens of Las Vegas, Southwest Rotary President Bruce MacKenzie was pleased to help kick-off his campaign this year with a \$2,500 contribution.

In keeping with our focus on youth, we also recently provided a \$1,000 grant to a local special education teacher to buy books for his students. His focus is to make sure they have access to books, instead of spending all day on electronic devices.

The best part is that we get to come together again this March to bring things full circle as these former RYLA campers become the leaders. For as long as I'm involved with these camps, and that will be a long time, they will always be my first crew and the one I measure all others against. I love these kids.
