


Fred Claire was a member of the Los Angeles Dodgers front office for 30 years, advancing from Publicity Director to Executive Vice President and General Manager, responsible for player personnel decisions and baseball operations.


Claire joined the Dodgers in 1969 and proved to be an award-winning executive at every stage of his career. He directed the teamâ \in ^{TMS} marketing efforts when the Dodgers first hit the three-million mark in attendance and established a period of record-setting attendance figures. He was instrumental in creating the branding of â \in cDodger Blueâ \in and the subsequent â \in cThink Blueâ \in campaign.

In April 1987, Claire was named General Manager of the Dodgers. When the team won the World Series in 1988, he was selected Major League Baseball $\hat{\mathbf{e}}^{\mathsf{TM}}$ s $\hat{\mathbf{e}}$ eExecutive of the Year $\hat{\mathbf{e}}$ 6 by The Sporting News. Claire became the fifth Dodger executive in the team $\hat{\mathbf{e}}$ 6 history to win the award.

Since his departure from the Dodgers in June 1998, Claire has maintained an active schedule as an educator and has long served on the boards of the Rose Bowl, the Special Olympics of Southern California, the Los Angeles Sports Council, and the First Tee program of Pasadena.

Claire currently serves as a Patient Speaker for the City of Hope.


