"Navigating the Promises and Perils of AI for Business & Society"

Dr. John G. Mooney Pepperdine Professor, MIT Research Fellow

Abstract:

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is reshaping the landscape of business and society, offering both immense promise and significant challenges. In this talk, Dr. Mooney will explore the two facets of AIâ€″the opportunities it presents and the risks it entails. He will begin by delving into the promises of AI, emphasizing data-driven decision-making, automation, and innovation. Real-world examples will illustrate how AI increases efficiency, enhances customer experiences, and fuels creativity. However, he also identifies the perils: ethical dilemmas and harm arising from biased algorithms, job displacement due to automation, and security vulnerabilities. He then discusses potential paths forwardâ€″collaboration across stakeholders, responsible regulation, and public education.

Join us for this timely overview of today's AI landscape to become prepared to unravel its potential and grapple with its dangers.

Dr. John G. Mooney is Professor of Information Systems and Technology Management at the Pepperdine Graziadio Business School, an Academic Research Fellow at the MIT Sloan Center for Information Systems Research (CISR), a Fellow of the Association for Information Systems, and a member of the boards of the Executive DBA Council and Science Foundation Irelandâ∈™s Research Centre for Software - Lero. Dr. Mooney holds a BS in Computer Science and a Master of Management Science both from University College Dublin, in Ireland, and a Ph.D. in Information Systems and Business Strategy from UC Irvine. He consults to senior management on IT-enabled innovation, information management, and IT management, and was a co-founder and Non-Executive Director of RealEx Payments. John is married to Dr. Angela Tripoli, who coaches executives and professionals through leadership, life and career transitions. He volunteers his time as a Docent, Lead Trail Boss and Lead Land Steward at the Irvine Ranch Conservancy and is being encouraged by his neighbor to join the San Juan Capistrano Rotary.

In the Spotlight - Mark Bixby Leadership Award 2024

The **Mark Bixby Leadership Award** is one of many scholarships presented to deserving local students by the **Long Beach Rotary Scholarship Foundation**. This particular award was created "to honor an extraordinary man who learned from every experience.â€

Mark Bixby had learned at an early age to discover the needs of the community, and to find a way to fill those gaps and help others. He was a leader, and so this Scholarship is given to a student who possesses many of these same qualities.

This year it was awarded to **Grace Hughes**.

When Grace was growing up in Long Beach, she was looking for a career path from a very young age. She already knew she wanted to have a job that made a difference. Her very first job aspiration was at age 4, when she declared she would be a firefighter one day. Soon after, she changed her mind when it dawned on her that she was deathly afraid of heights and fire.

At age 9, she decided she would one day become a nurse, just like her aunt. But after hearing many of her aunt's stories of patients and the hospital (with all the gory details), Grace nixed that plan as well.

But this was a continuing pattern for Grace as she got older; she would choose one profession after another, only to discover it would not be the right fit for her.

When she started high school at Long Beach Poly, she signed up for the Cross-Country team because she enjoyed running. She also enjoyed her English classes; she especially liked to write. She felt very encouraged by all her English teachers, and credits them for guiding and supporting her on her writing path.

Being shy and soft-spoken, Grace never thought of herself as being a leader of any kind. She thought a leader was someone who enjoyed the spotlight, who had no trouble speaking to groups of people, and who seemed to always know what to say and do.

Once she entered college and began Journalism classes, she began to challenge herself. She took on leadership positions by becoming the Managing Editor of LBCCâ \in TMs Viking News, and also by taking the Shift Lead position at her part-time job. She didnâ \in TMt know everything she was supposed to say or do, but that was okay, she figured it out. Her confidence grew.

By going through these experiences, Grace learned that leaders aren't born that way - they get there by falling down and making mistakes. And even more importantly, by learning from those mistakes. Confidence was important, but equally as important, was having humility.

This is why Grace is the perfect recipient of the **2024 Mark Bixby Leadership Award**. As she embarks on her chosen career of Public Relations and Journalism, she has already become a true leader, she loves her city of Long Beach, and she wants to make a positive impact on her community.
