President Randy returned to the podium and introduced 2 new members. The first was April Hale who was welcomed back to the club. Dental industry and strategic accountant manager and passionately advocates for dental health and community care. She serves Board President of Special Wish Foundation of SW Ohio and a grass roots advocate for oral health progress through Care Quest. She lives in Kettering with her husband Jon and Beau, her rescue dog.

The second member is Mary McDonald who was named an honorary member. She has a storied and extensive record in local politics, starting as the first African American elected as a Montgomery County commissioner and ending as being the Mayor of the City of Trotwood in 2023. In Trotwood she was a transformative leader, and her efforts included revitalization of economic development in the City of Trotwood, and surrounding areas, including manufacturing, housing and new businesses. She ensured Trotwood's voices were heard. She has received numerous awards for her efforts in community development and for her leadership roles. She is the proud mother of 3 and grandmother of 4.

Kappy Kilburn was called to the podium to introduce our speakers for the day. Team members from The Goodwill Easterseals Miami Valley Miracle Clubhouse were introduced. Brandon Spatz has been a member since 2016, and advocate for change in the way we look at mental health issues. He is also a Miracle Clubhouse international faculty member and other organizations. Kathy Trick is the Program Director for the Clubhouse. Her focus is to erase the stigma associated with mental illness. She watched her brother suffer from mental illness and from lack of empathy and services. She has an MA from University of Dayton, and in 2016 was voted in as 40 under 40 winner. Her 3 sons keep her on the go. Michaela Leach is the program coordinator with the Clubhouse and received her MA from the University of Kentucky. She worked at WSU and interned at the Miracle Clubhouse and fell in love with the model. She is a new mom and that occupies much of her time.

The Miracle Clubhouse Team came to the podium to educate us about the organization. Michaela explained what programs are provided at the Clubhouse. It is a place where adults with serious mental illness volunteer to participate in their own recovery process by working and socializing together in a safe, welcoming environment. There is housing, employment and medical/psychological opportunities offered through the clubhouse. One year at the clubhouse costs less than a week in the hospital. The club heard testimonials from people who have benefited from utilizing the high-impact services from, and working at, the clubhouse.

Brandon informed us that Clubhouse International has proven model of over 70 years (since 1948) and has clubhouses across Ohio and the country. There are currently 370 clubhouses in 36 states and 32 countries. There are 12 international training bases worldwide. Brandon travels all over the country to ensure that the clubhouses are following the model which includes 37 standards. Psychiatric rehabilitation includes those standards, along with a work-focused day, employment and education, community integration and support, promotes health and wellness, addresses housing issues, and promotes community education and advocacy. Employment is a large part of recovery. Miracle Clubhouse employment is described as transitional employment, which was described on the pamphlets left on tables. Miracle Clubhouse is always looking for community partners who can employ members in an entry-level position if there is a gap or an employee leave situation experienced by the partner. The member is often hired on a full-time basis after the transition period. Brandon shared his personal experience with mental illness and the help and hope he found as a member of Miracle Clubhouse, and now that he works for the organization. Clubhouses have 2 units or departments: hospitality and business. The hospitality unit focuses on providing staff and member prepared lunches and cleanliness of the club. The business unit focuses on budget, revenue, and newsletter issues.

Kathy Trick discussed ways to support Miracle Clubhouse in its mission. One of the most impactful ways to help is by local businesses becoming partners with the Clubhouse and hiring its members. Each year there is a fundraiser through Goodwill Easter seals Miami Valley called "We Are Mental Illness". It will be held on May 15 and tickets are available on Goodwill's website. The Clubhouse is funded through Goodwill Easter Seals and its programs are mission-based. They also receive grants and personal donations. The club serves 25-30 members per day.

Kim Bramlage drew the lucky number for the Queen of Hearts but did not draw the lucky card. The pot will increase from today's total of \$1380. Next week's speakers will be Lauren Lee Truesdale and Kate McEwen, of The Foodbank, Inc. We were led in the reciting of the Four Way Test. Next week will be Red Ribbon Take Over meeting. President Randy then adjourned the meeting.



NEW HONORARY MEMBER PROFILE



Mary A. McDonald begins her first term as Montgomery County Commissioner after being the first African American elected to the role. She concluded her tenure as Mayor of the City of Trotwood, Ohio, in 2023, after serving with distinction. She began her public service on the Trotwood City Council in 2005 and was elected Mayor in 2016.

As Mayor, Mary was a transformative leader who championed Trotwood's growth and revitalization. Her efforts attracted several million dollars in capital investment, repurposed underutilized retail spaces, and addressed infrastructure challenges that had been neglected for over 45 years. Under her leadership, the city achieved significant milestones, including reversing a potential financial crisis, improving Trotwood's Moody's bond rating to AAA, and fostering economic development that brought numerous major corporations to the area. Companies such as Stratacache, Specialty Manufacturing, Korrect Plumbing Heating and Air, and many others have contributed to the city's thriving economy.

Mary also spearheaded the development of market-rate housing, marking the first new home construction in Trotwood in over 17 years. One of her signature initiatives was the renovation and reopening of the Trotwood Community and Cultural Arts Center, which now hosts Central State University. This partnership has expanded educational and agricultural opportunities for residents of Trotwood and the surrounding region. Through her advocacy and collaboration with state and federal leaders, Mary has ensured that Trotwood's

voice is heard, bringing resources and benefits that will have a lasting impact on the community. Her vision and dedication have firmly established Trotwood as a regional leader in economic development and homeownership.

Mary's community involvement extends beyond her elected duties. She serves on the Boards of Trustees for Goodwill Easterseals and Discover Classical (88.1 and 89.9 FM). She co-chaired the Trotwood Community Improvement Corporation (TCIC).

Her achievements have been widely recognized. Mary is a recipient of the Humanitarian Award from the National Conference for Community & Justice of Greater Dayton, the YWCA Women of Influence Award, and the Visionary Leadership Award from Leadership Ohio, among many others. The Better Business Bureau's Women in Business Networking program named her one of the "25 Women to Watch," and she is a proud alumna of Leadership Ohio's prestigious 2021 cohort.

Mary is equally dedicated to her family. She is the proud mother of Alexandra "Kate" (Shamel) Rivers and Daniel Allen Caldwell, and a loving grandmother and "GiGi" to Sydney, London, and Zahra Rivers.


