Next, Nancy Farkas was invited to the podium to welcome guests and visitors. Kelly Lehman introduced Adrian Miller from NCCJ as her guest. Linda Groover introduced her guest, the new exchange student for Dayton Rotary, Elaine Lumonya from Uganda. Elaine made a few remarks of thanks to Rotary members and in particular, to Kim Bramlage and Heath McAlpine for being her two host families while she is here. Elaine also presented President Randy with a flag to commemorate the start of her exchange year. Tom Carlisle was welcomed as an online guest as well.

Sarah Hippensteel Hall was invited to the podium where she announced that birthdays and Day-tens would be put on hold for this week to allow for more time for our guest speakers to present. Sarah welcomed President Randy back to the podium where he gave a brief intro on the work that the Rotary Foundation Committee has been doing for the last year to prepare the Signature Grant process. Cathy Ponitz and Lisa Grigsby were recognized for chairing the efforts and developing the application and review process. Randy invited Cathy to the podium to explain the process in more detail. Cathy started by inviting Foundation Committee members to stand and be recognized for their work during the review process. The single grant for \$50,000 will be of significant impact for our community. The focus of the grant is on Mental Health and includes any mental health initiative from substance abuse to suicide prevention. Out of nearly 40 applications, there were 3 grant requests that were selected using the committee's review criteria. Today's meeting will include 10-minute presentations of the 3 applications by the organizations who submitted them. The Foundation trustees will make the final decision, but we would like the input of Rotary members via the forms on tables, based on the presentations today. The winner will be announced at Rotary's Summerfest event on September 21st.

Daybreak: Tyra Jackson the Chief Operating Officer and Luke Carey, the Chief Development Officer from Daybreak were invited to the podium to present first. A brief history of the organization was shared. The mission has stayed true since the doors opened in the 70s, with adaptations to the changes in their clients' needs along the way. Daybreak primarily provides holistic services to homeless youth in our community, serving children as young as 10 and as old as their early 20s. All clients have experienced persistent mental health issues throughout their young lives and come to Daybreak from a variety of outlets including walk-ins, partner referrals, the 24-hour helpline, and canvasing neighborhoods. Housing is the number one priority for their safety. Care includes preventative, immediate, and after care to help the clients stabilize their situations and to help them not fall back into homelessness.

Safe Pets Program: Jane Keiffer President/CEO from Artemis Domestic Violence Resource Center and Jack Omer, President/CEO of SICSA Pet Adoption and Wellness Center were introduced as the next grant applicants. Their innovative partnership shines a light on the issue of domestic violence&F™s impact on not just the survivor but also on the pets they may have in the home. 71% of abuse survivors have witnessed abuse or even death of a pet at the hands of an abuser. It is a barrier that many domestic violence survivors have to overcome when making a decision to leave an abusive home. What will happen to my pet? This program gives survivors peace of mind to know their pets will be taken care of through a foster program until their own lives have stabilized. Awareness that this program exists will give survivors confidence to make the decision to leave abusive situations and seek help. Grant funds will be used by SICSA for the animal care and enhancement of the foster program. Artemis will use the funds to support staff to develop safety plans for survivors and build awareness that pets will be protected.

Emerge Recovery...A New View of Wellness: Elaine Bonner, the Director of Philanthropy at Emerge Recovery was the final presenter. Emerge is a one-stop mental health, housing, job training and therapy program for veterans, first responders, and adults with substance abuse disorders. The program for which funding is requested involves partnerships with two other organizations, Valor Therapeutics and Warriors on Wheels Cycling. Programs at Emerge have served 350 people in their first year of operation. Emerge programs provide a holistic continuum of care including inpatient treatment and recovery care on their campus in Greene County. Veterans are a large part of their recovery clients. There are over 50,000 veterans in and around Montgomery County. Valor Therapeutics will offer art and music therapy and yoga and mindfulness opportunities to coordinate with the clinical therapies to build resiliency. Warriors on Wheels will further enhance the program through building relationships with warriors and cycling group sessions. The program's objective is to elevate mental health to a new level of importance. The program is open to men and women.

Cathy Ponitz thanked the presenters and asked Rotarians to complete the forms on the tables with any feedback they want the Foundation Committee to consider in the coming weeks as they make their final decisions. Cathy was then asked to draw for the Queen of Hearts raffle. Jena Pado pulled the 10 of diamonds from the deck so the pot continues to grow.

President Randy announced that Governor Mike DeWine is the speaker for next week's meeting. He then invited Elaine Lumonya to the podium to do our 4 Way Test. The meeting was adjourned at 1:02 pm.


Please consider helping students in need as they head back to school this fall! Most requested items include:
