Concluding DayTens, Secretary Sarah announced that bowling starts October 7. Talent not required â€" see Steve Naas to sign up. Her water fact for the week: We're in a drought â€" the most severe conditions are in southeast Ohio, where they were rated D4, the worst since ratings started in 2000.

President Randy returned to the podium to remind Rotarians that Summerfest is our first big community event so it's important every Rotarian supports it. We're also awarding our \$50,000 signature grant at the event. He then turned it over to Stephen Keyes for the week's member spotlight.

Stephen Keyes family owns Key-Ads, a third-generation family business that covers 30 counties in Ohio and 10 in Indiana. They have close to 2000 signs, 70 of which are digital. Key-Ads is running digital billboards advertising Summerfest free of charge.

President Randy turned it over to Chair of the Day Caryl Segalewitz to introduce our speaker. Lance Detrick has served as President & CEO of Goodwill Easterseals Miami Valley for ten years. They serve twenty-nine counties in west, central, and southern Ohio, as well as two counties in northern Kentucky.

Lance Detrick took the podium and credited their success to outstanding community support. Lance took over ten years ago, around the same time they opened their Main Street Service. Goodwill Easterseals mission is to empower individuals with disabilities and other disadvantages to achieve independence and a better quality of life.

Natalie F. Hudson, Professor of Political Science at the University of Dayton They offer Program Services (employment, vocational, behavioral & health, developmental disabilities, seniors) Retail Services (roughly 50% of employees have a disability), and Business Services (cleaning, roughly 80% of employees have a disability).

In 2014, they opened their Community Service Center and Headquarters â€" the largest capital project in their history. In 2015, Miracle Clubhouse opened, serving individuals with incurable diseases. In 2015, Miami Valley Works launched. The West Central Regional Headquarters opened in Lima in 2016, when they also opened four more stores and merged with Daymont to provide behavioral health services. The Oakwood store opened in 2017. In 2018, they received the Goodwill Retail Excellence Award, outperforming over 150 other Goodwill agencies. They also received a Google Digital Skills Grant and grew business services to \$6M in revenue. In 2019, the Clayton and Fairborn stores opened; they served over 20,000 individuals, a record number of people; and they launched a capital campaign for West Dayton.

The year 2020 was the best and the worst: they received a \$10M gift from Mackenzie Scott (1 of 384 nonprofits awarded out of 6,904 considered â€" only nonprofit in Dayton to receive funds); their stores were deemed non-essential and closed during the pandemic, forcing them to lay off 500 employees; they helped over 700 with unemployment filing; they expanded business services with a sanitization contract for WPAFB; they launched their Laundry Bag service; and they reopened their stores for a great second half of the year. In 2021, they opened Hilsboro and St. Mary stores, and they launched the HEART initiative â€" Helping Employees Achieve Results & Triumphs based on the Dream Manager book. The Beavercreek Senior Adult Day Programs finally reopened, reaccreditation went well, and they began conversations with the Portsmouth chapter to merge in 2022. Last year was the busiest year in their ninety-year history. They opened the West Campus Community Service Center, built to help change the image of Trotwood, in 2023 and merged with Goodwill of Southern Ohio, adding four southern OH and two northern KY counties to their territory.

Lance pointed out that our Goodwill Easterseals ranks better in job placement (roughly 3x better placement rate) than others; the Retail division has high net revenue per household than most of their peers; and their effective management and leadership attracted Goodwill Southern Ohio to merge. They served 22,359 in 2023, up 17% over the previous year. They placed 1,014 in employments, run forty-one stores, and operate in twenty-nine counties.

Looking ahead, they are growing and expanding their behavioral health offerings, with plans to accept private insurance, expand to Vandalia, three TIPS classes in full swing, and focus on early childhood mental health (specifically working with toddlers kicked out of kindergarten). ALL Club launched in 2023 as a pilot for teens and young adults based on a clubhouse model â€" the second location opened at the main campus. ALL Club teaches participants about allyship, leadership, and lifeship. ESOL services launched in 2020 and expanded to Springfield (including Haitian). Comprehensive Case Management Employment Program (CCMEP) for 16-20 year olds receiving TANF funds transition to independence. Goodwill Easter Seals also seeks to positively impact the social determinants of health â€" help with monitoring, prevention, and education. They are looking at continued retail growth with stores scheduled to open in Vandalia and Urbana, and they are expanding Business Services by growing the janitorial and sewing operations.

Lance thanked the club for their support and opened it up to questions.

Dr. Susan Hayes shared her experience working at the Goodwill Store at 5^{th} & Wilkinson in 1976 when she moved to Dayton. Growth since then is formidable.

President Domigan returned to the podium for the Queen of Hearts drawing. Kim Bramlage won, but did not pull the Queen of Hearts.

Our speaker next week is Alice Young-Basora of the International Peace Museum.

Marc Pedro led members in the 4-way test before President Randy adjourned the meeting.
