Adam Horseman, Montgomery Insurance and Investments â€"60-Second Vocational Spotlight Adam's job as a commercial insurance expert is to protect the things that we care about. He asked for a show of hands from Rotarians who volunteer on nonprofit boards; if these nonprofits have board insurance; and if we understand the scope of protection that these policies provide.

Featured Speaker Chief Justice Sharon L. Kennedy, Ohio Supreme Court was introduced by Chair of the Day, Scott Kayser.

Sharon L. Kennedy was elected Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Ohio in November 2022. She is the eleventh Chief Justice and the second woman to serve in the role. Chief Justice Kennedy was first elected to the Court in 2012 to fill an unexpired term. She was elected to her first full term in November 2014 and re-elected in November 2020.

Prior to her term on the Court, she served at the Butler County Court of Common Pleas, Domestic Relations Division beginning in 1999 and as administrative judge of the division from 2005 until December of 2012. Chief Justice Kennedy began her career in the justice system as a police officer at the Hamilton Police Department. She received her law degree from the University of Cincinnati College of Law, has managed her own private practice and also worked as special counsel for the Ohio Attorney General.

In her talk, Justice Kennedy said that she has spoken at many Rotary Clubs throughout Ohio and thanked Rotarians for their many generous initiatives that have improved local and global communities. She noted that the Rotary's "Four Way Test†is aligned with the values of our nation's Founding Fathers.

Her talk centered on the three key elements that comprise an independent judiciary.

â€"Element 1 Fidelity to the separation of powers presupposes there is a proper role for each branch of the government. â€"Element 2 The judiciary must adhere to a set of principles both in procedural matters and in interpreting the law. Procedural principles focus on only what is necessary to decide a case. Interpreting the law falls on a continuum of judicial precedence ranging from textualism to contextualism. —Element 3 When the rule of law is tested, it can be restored by the legislature or by the judiciary overturning a prior decision.

Chief Justice Kennedy shared enlightening references to the Federalist Papers and examples from history and Ohio case law to illustrate each element. Chief Justice Kennedy also emphasized that Ohio citizens have the power to overturn a decisión of the Ohio Supreme Court. She urged us to read the Federalist Papers and at least two Ohio Supreme Court decisions each year.
