PROGRAM

Fellow Rotarian **Jennifer Roberts** introduced our speaker, Amy Albery, CEO of Wallick Communities. Wallick builds and manages affordable and senior living communities, focusing on addressing the housing shortage and improving housing affordability.

Albery explained that housing affordability is defined as paying less than 30% of your income on rent or a mortgage. A key metric used to determine affordability is Area Median Income (AMI), which for Central Ohio is \$72,400. Affordable housing is defined for those earning between 31% and 80% of AMI. Workforce housing applies to those earning 81% to 120% of AMI, and market–rate housing is for those earning more than 120% of AMI.

The "missing middle" refers to people who earn too much to qualify for housing subsidies but not enough to afford market-rate housing. For example, extremely low income is defined as \$21,720 annually, which allows for a housing budget of \$543 per month. Low income is \$43,440 annually, with a \$1,086 monthly housing budget. Workforce housing is \$65,160 annually, with a \$1,629 monthly budget.

Albery highlighted how the housing supply and demand were balanced until the Great Recession in 2008, which caused a significant disruption. After 2008, construction slowed dramatically, lending practices tightened, and foreclosures spiked. Between 2010 and 2020, the housing deficit grew steadily, contributing to today's affordability crisis.

The lowest earners have been hit hardest, with 98% of the population now spending more than 50% of their income on housing. Central Ohio's housing shortage was delayed compared to other regions, which means the impact of the recession was slower to surface but still significant.

Albery discussed Wallick's upcoming housing project in Heath, which aims to address this shortage by providing a range of affordable options. The development will cover 47 acres of a larger 300-acre project located behind the Heath Wal-Mart. It will feature 424 one- and two-bedroom apartment units priced between 75% and 120% of AMI.

The project will also include 42,000 square feet of commercial and retail space across four mixed-use buildings, creating a downtown-style atmosphere for Heath. Additionally, the project will include adult cottages for seniors. Construction is set to begin in the coming months, with leasing expected to start in 2026. The first phase should be completed by 2028, with a second phase focused on assisted living to follow.
