Fellow Rotarian, **Rob Montagnese**, introduced our speaker, Mark Kwamme, a seasoned venture capitalist and entrepreneur who has played a transformative role in Ohio's economic development.

In 2013, he co–founded Drive Capital, a venture capital firm focused on investing in high–growth companies outside the traditional tech hubs of Silicon Valley and New York. Based in Columbus, Drive Capital has managed over \$2.2 billion in investments, funding businesses across healthcare, software, and advanced manufacturing. His work with Drive Capital has played a crucial role in positioning Columbus as a growing technology and innovation hub, attracting talent and capital from across the country.

Following his success with Drive Capital, Kwamme pursued a lifelong passion for race car driving. He competed in prestigious global events, including the 24 Hours of Le Mans and the 24 Hours of Daytona, showcasing his drive for excellence in yet another arena. However, his deep commitment to fostering economic growth and opportunity in Ohio brought him back to the business world.

Inspired by the success of Singapore's Temasek model, Kwamme founded The Ohio Fund, an investment initiative focused on strengthening Ohio's economy through strategic investments in key industries. His vision for The Ohio Fund is to create sustainable, long–term economic growth by leveraging Ohio's existing strengths in manufacturing, healthcare, and technology, ensuring the state remains at the forefront of innovation.

Kwamme's leadership and investment strategies have had a profound impact on Ohio's economic landscape. Through his work with JobsOhio, Drive Capital, and now The Ohio Fund, he continues to shape the future of the state, ensuring it remains a competitive and thriving business environment. His dedication to innovation, job creation, and economic development makes him a key figure in Ohio's ongoing success story, solidifying his legacy as a leader who has truly made a difference.
