#### **ANNOUNCEMENTS**

- **Heather Powell** reminded everyone of Pilsners for Polio, a multi-club event on October 30th from 4:30–7:30 at Earthworks Café. 10% of the proceeds will go to polio eradication.
- **Brad Shumaker** announced that he is putting together a Veterans Day event. He asked for all names of Rotary veterans be sent to him over the next two weeks. He will then be in touch.
- **Brendan Underwood** recognized all volunteers who participated in the Licking River Round Up. It was a very successful event this year.



#### **PROGRAM**

**Pamela Watkins** introduced our program of **Brad Shumaker**, retired Colonel, USMC. **Brad** spoke about his experience working in the Pentagon on 9/11/2001. He was in the Pentagon that morning. He was inside the "National Military Command Center", serving as a Lt. Col. The FAA and NORAD are both responsible for the defense of US air space. Both the FAA and NORAD assumed that hijacked airplanes occurs far away, leaving time for reaction, such as a guided missile attack. The NMCC sees hijackings as an FAA responsibility and NMCC would provide backup and observation.

The NMCC is comprised of 5 Operations Teams, plus a training and standards division. All of their work is top secret and classified, so you won't find information about it. Each operations team has 18–20 service members. Each Training and Standards division consists of 10–14 service members. Brad was in leading the Training and Standards division on 9/11.

Prior to the plane hitting the Pentagon at 9:37, Brad was in a meeting. 22,000 people work in the Pentagon on any given day. As soon as the plane hit, they felt an "overpressure"; nothing that hurt, but it didn't feel right. Immediately, the alarm started going off. As the day goes on, for the first three hours, it was still trying to work through conference calls. They were asking questions and reporting up to the President of the United States, the Secretary of Defense, and the Vice Chair of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. About 4 hours through the day, about 1:00 in the afternoon, the fires continued to burn where the plane hit, and it also started burning around the top of the roof that had wood sections. The roof had satellites for top-secret communication, which was worrisome if communication was lost.

Brad formed a new 18-person team with the NMCC members on site. They moved through the Pentagon with armed guards due to the top secret information they were carrying. The team boarded a helicopter, flying over the Pentagon and traffic was horrendous. It reminded Brad of "War of the Worlds". They flew up the Potomac River toward Gettysburg, PA. Within 3–5 miles of the Pentagon, the team saw kids playing at recess, people playing golf, etc...; it was very weird to see.

They went to Site-R Processing Center, which was designed in the 1950s, to withstand a nuclear bombing. It essentially serves as a disaster recovery site for the Pentagon. The team arrived at Site-R that afternoon and got set up.

4,000–5,000 people work in each "wedge" of the Pentagon, and it just so happened that the wedge that was attacked that morning had just completed a major renovation, and so most employees in that wedge had not moved into their permanent offices yet.
