### **PROGRAM**

**Heather Powell** introduced David Deibel, Co-Executive Director of the Land Bank.

Land Bank is formally known as Land Reutilization Corporation, a quasi-governmental organization. Ohio's county land banks were first established in 2008. As of 2024, 69 of the 88 counties in Ohio have Land Banks.

In Licking County, there are three employees at the Land Bank and works under the auditor's office. Licking County's Land Bank was established in 2015. In 2016, the Land Bank started cleaning and purchasing properties. They do have a board of directors. There is a county treasurer, two county commissioners and representatives. Tax foreclosures are one of the biggest ways that they acquire properties. There are judicial foreclosures, expedited foreclosures through the board of revision and private tax lien foreclosures. Land is also acquired through donations and deeds—in—lieu of foreclosure and also, forfeited properties. The Land Bank can also purchase property, but they do not do that often.

Land Banks are funded in a variety of ways. These include Delinquent Tax and Assessment Collection fund (DTAC), Income from property sales and from Federal/ State/Private grant funding. Land Banks are the designated lead entity. It looks like they spend millions but they front the money and get reimbursed. The desired outcome for the Land Bank is to increase values and promote sustainable neighborhoods, facilitate new development consistent with community plans and maintain existing housing where feasible and preserve historic structures for future redevelopment and strategically eliminate blight. The acquired properties are often consistent with demolition. This can be due to the fact that rehabilitation is not an option, elimination of flight helps create safer and healthier neighborhoods and land banks sometimes have the ability to apply for funding to help with demolition costs. There are rehabilitation projects. This includes partnering with Habitat for Humanity, Licking County Housing Coalition, Community Groups and Local Investors. This helps create work for local contractors, first time homeowners and volunteer opportunities. Sales are granted to responsible, qualified buyers. They can sell as side lots, buildable/ acreage lots, improved lots and commercial lots.

The commercial lots are relative to market value but everything else is sold substantially less. Every now and then, the Land Bank keeps lots for future development and collaboration. The Licking County Land Bank is the best solution to a problem. There are endless possibilities for some of these properties including urban gardens, playgrounds and additional parking for businesses, schools or churches.

Recent and current projects include 325 W. Main St., Newark, 390 E. Main St., Kirkersville, 10 Jefferson St., Newark, 250 Mill St., Pataskala and 3447 Raccoon Valley Rd., Granville.
