## PROGRAM

**Rotarian David Lewis** introduced Mike Davis, President of Junior Achievement of Central Ohio. Mike has held the position since 2010 and has led a \$10 million campaign to expand the organization's impact. Junior Achievement's mission is to equip young people with the tools to succeed in adulthood and to build a stronger future workforce through systemic change. Prior to joining Junior Achievement, Mike held leadership roles at United Way. He holds a Bachelor of Arts in History from the University of Florida and was named CEO of the Year by Columbus CEO magazine in 2011.

Mr. Davis began his presentation by noting that April is Financial Literacy Month. He discussed how Junior Achievement works to align educators, employers, and both the public and private sectors to help students manage their careers and lives. He shared third-party data that compared outcomes of young adults ages 18–29 who participated in the program versus those who did not, including a higher rate of independent living among participants.

Junior Achievement has operated a learning center in Columbus for 27 years, and on January 13, 2025, a new center was opened in Newark with strong community support. A dozen school districts from the region have already brought students to the facility, which serves students within an hour's drive. Mike emphasized that their core mission is helping young people reflect on their values and envision their future beyond just choosing a job. They are working to deepen engagement with both students and employers and plan to grow the center over the years. Currently, 2,000 students are engaged at the new location.

He shared the impact of JA BizTown, a program where 10-year-olds take on roles such as CEO or CFO and manage tasks like building a budget or assembling a Big Mac. These hands-on activities are more than theoretical; they help children build real-world skills, understand teamwork, and develop financial responsibility. Many local businesses are featured in both BizTown and Finance Park, including LMHS, Robertson Construction, Mortellaro's McDonald's, Park National Bank, and more. These partnerships help bring the experience to life and expose students to real career paths in their own community. One student shared they didn't think their parents even knew how much budgeting mattered. Toward the end of the presentation, Junior Achievement Newark Advisory Committee members who were present and are also Rotarians were recognized with a round of applause.

Following the program, all Rotarians were invited to tour the Junior Achievement Center in Newark—an awesome opportunity to see firsthand where these students come to learn, grow, and explore their futures.
