

## **PROGRAM**

**Jennifer Roberts** introduced today's guest, Tara Houdeshell, Executive Director of A Call to College. Tara joined A Call to College in 2014 and became Executive Director in 2018.

A Call to College (ACTC) was founded in 1991 by Lou Mitchell and Jane McConnell as a college access program for Newark City Schools, based on Columbus City Schools' "I Know I Can" program. The Mission of ACTC is "To assure every NCS student the opportunity to pursue and complete education after high school." ACTC provides programming in 7 grade levels at NCS, starting in 2nd grade. 48% of its budget goes to scholarships and 41% is for direct services provided to students.

In working with 2nd graders, ACTC promotes reading and dreaming. The Denison Football program partners with ACTC to read in the classroom to second graders. In 4th grade, ACTC runs a multi-week program about financial literacy where students earn real money to donate to local charities. In 6th grade, every NCS student takes a field trip to a local college campus. In 8th grade, students work on career exploration increasing their knowledge of career options and possibilities. Programming is provided at Newark High School for 9th, 11th and 12th graders. In 9th grade, students learn the importance of school attendance, GPA and extracurricular activities.

For upperclassmen, there are 12 staff members at ACTC who meet one-on-one with juniors twice and four times for seniors. They help students create and execute a plan with regard to their college search, career search, campus visits, scholarships and the FAFSA form. A Call to College provides significant ACT preparation and programming complete with practice tests and study sessions.

A Call to College is also a huge help to Newark HS students navigating the college application process. The "College Application Blitz" is an event like a college fair where seniors complete their applications on the spot. College representatives are there to help with scholarship applications and FAFSA completion and many students get their application fees waived.

ACTC is famous for its last dollar grants provided to NHS students pursuing post–secondary education. In 2024, ACTC set 2 new records: most students helped, and most dollars awarded. ACTC awarded last dollar grants to 327 students and the total dollars awarded was just shy of \$600,000!

Currently, ACTC is in the middle of executing its Strategic Plan, which includes revising their advising program to meet with mores students. They are looking to raise college retention and completion rates and reduce student unmet financial need. Finally, ACTC is working to improve their messaging to ensure that everyone knows they help with education after high school, not just the traditional four year degree.
