District Governor Amelia joined the Gainesville-Haymarket Rotary Club in 2006 where she served as President in 2011-12 before transferring to the Warrenton Club in 2013, serving as club President in 2022-23. A graduate of Rotary Leadership Institute, a member of both the Polio Plus and Paul Harris Societies, and a Major Donor, Amelia has served the District as an Assistant Governor for Area 5 and as the District Major Service Project Support Committee Chair.

Amelia is passionate about ending human trafficking and modern slavery. She is the co-chair of the Fauquier Anti Sex Trafficking Alliance, a service project of the Rotary Club of Warrenton. FASTA's mission is to safeguard their community through education and prevention by building strategic partnerships. Amelia was honored to represent her club and District at the 2019 Rotary International Convention in Hamburg, serving on a panel of speakers from the Netherlands, Nigeria, and the USA to share about how local clubs can tackle human trafficking prevention in their own communities through building partnerships, using her club and county as the model for Rotary's local efforts worldwide. After attending she joined the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery (RAGAS) where she now serves as the RAGAS Virginia State Coordinator working with the three Rotary districts in Virginia and joined the RAGAS global board in 2022. Additionally, Amelia co-chairs the Zone 33/34 Human Trafficking Prevention Taskforce for Director Patrick Eakes. In 2021 Amelia facilitated a focus

group of subject matter experts from three continents over several months to create the RAGAS Community Awareness & Prevention Education (CAPE) strategic action plan and continues to present it to Rotarians and RAGAS members around the world to help everyone be a super-hero in their own community! She shared the CAPE plan and inspired Rotarians to unleash their superpowers to end slavery at the 2022 RI convention in Houston and 2023 in Melbourne.

Amelia is President of Unstoppable Futures, where she is a business consultant and strategic planner for businesses, agencies, municipalities, and NGOs.

Outside of work and Rotary, Amelia is active in her community serving on the Mason Enterprise Center Advisory Board and the Commercial & Industrial Land Exchange Board of Directors. Amelia loves traveling and she and her husband, Troy, are on a personal mission to visit 50 countries and all 50 states before 50. Her hobbies include travel, cooking and gardening. Troy and Amelia juggle a full and rewarding life in Warrenton with their daughters Amelia Grace who is in Interact and Bitsy who is in EarlyAct at their school.



Program - AG Jamie Larounis

Jamie is serving as Assistant Governor of Area 4 of Rotary District 7610 for this Rotary year. The AG is responsible for supporting club effectiveness by assisting



the Governor with the administration of their assigned clubs. The AG is assisted by a team including, at the discretion of the District Governor, a Foundation Chair, Service Chair, Membership Chair, Public Image Coordinator, and the resources of Rotary International. The clubs in our area are Fredericksburg, Fredericksburg/Rappahannock, Stafford, North Stafford, Dahlgren/King George, and University of Mary Washington Rotaract. AG Jamie shared a map of District 7610 (the yellow section of the map.)

In preparation for the DG Official Visit, Jamie told us about our District Governor, Amelia Stansell. He shared her vision for this Rotary year. Amelia's goal is to create **irresistible clubs**. This means fostering an environment where every member is engaged, inspired, and motivated to participate. The District 7610 group that went to Evanston had dinner with President Elect of RI Mario Cesar Martins de Camargo who spoke at the AscenCon.





Tips from a Rotary, Toastmasters Webinar:

How to Inspire Others through Storytelling

Do you have an answer ready if you are asked, Why Rotary? Even seasoned Rotary members struggle to answer this seemingly basic question if we're honest with ourselves, especially when speaking with prospective members. We inundate prospects with lists of what we do and proud accounts of how we do it, instead of helping them figure out why they might want to check out our next club meeting or service project in the first place.

Don't feel bad. Simon Sinek, a notable speaker and author on business leadership, points out, the way our brain processes language can make finding our "why" difficult. Sharing effective stories is one way we can get around this anatomical roadblock. My journey in Rotary and Toastmasters has convinced me that telling effective stories is imperative for our growth as membership organizations. We all have stories to tell – those inspiring Rotary "moments." And we can all learn to be better, even great, storytellers.

In April, I had the privilege of moderating a joint webinar produced by Rotary International and Toastmasters International, Connect & Inspire Through Storytelling. The distinguished panelists agreed that we must express ourselves through stories more often.

Nikita Williams, a Toronto Rotarian and Toastmaster, observed that good stories connect across every demographic and cultural boundary. Nikita emphasized creativity and personal adaptation. She compared selecting story elements to share to the process of choosing toppings for a pizza. Maybe even include pineapple!

Verity Price, the 2021 Toastmasters World Champion of Public Speaking shared a clever pneumonic device to help us remember the elements of a great story – **HOME:** Hero faces an **O**bstacle, then finds a **M**entor, and **E**merges successfully.

She also emphasized the importance of simplicity, editing, and practice.

According to Verity, the elements of a great story are like the number of blocks in a winning Jenga tower, just enough to keep it structurally sound. In another analogy, Verity talked about making breakfast for her son. She may keep the first pancake for herself, because it's usually not one of her better efforts. Similarly, the first attempt or two at sharing your story may not be ready for prime time, but practice can make it perfect.

Mike Carr, 2020 Toastmasters World Champion of Public Speaking, urged us to emphasize the humanity and humor in our stories, making what you say relatable to your audience up to the point of envisioning themselves as the hero of the stories you tell. The more vulnerability and authenticity you can bring to your story, the better, he advised.

So here's our call to action, as Nikita puts it. We all have stories to share, so we must find our unique voices and tell our stories in every space that we're in. To practice and get inspired, why not make it an agenda item at your next Rotary meeting to ask members to share their Rotary moments? You and the members of your club will then be ready to share a great story with a prospective member who asks, "Why Rotary?"




