Program – DG Amelia Stansell


President Jamie introduced DG Amelia. She gave us an overview of our district and our zone.

We are each Rotary members in our clubs, and our 59 Rotary and Rotaract clubs in Northern and Central Virginia are part of District 7610, divided into 11 areas. Beyond that we are part of Zone 33 with 17 Districts, and Zone 34 also with 34 Districts which Rotary International Director Patrick Eakes presides and represents us on the RI Board for 2 years.

Rotary International consists of 1.4MM Rotary and Rotaract members in approx. 46,000 clubs in 529 Districts, in 34 Zones spanning 213 countries. Our Rotary

International President this year is Stephanie Urchick who was selected in late

Summer 2022.





DG Amelia asked each of us to take one of the glittery paper stars that were on the table and write what we most love about Rotary on one side. On the other we were asked to write what we thought would make our club irresistable. She talked about the "Magic of Rotary" and irresistable Rotary clubs. She quoted RI President Stephanie: "We're not going to bring peace to the world, end polio, or grow membership by waving a wand and saying some funny words. It's up to you. YOU create the magic with every project completed, every dollar donated, and every new member inducted."



The Rotary Action plan gives us a framework to create a club strategic plan. It has four parts –

- Increase our Impact
- Expand our Reach
- Enhance Participant Engagement
- Increase our Ability to Adapt



Increase Our Impact

❖ Support The Rotary Foundation AND DO MORE Service Projects! Goal of \$1,000,000 to the Annual Fund Share this year − so we can do more good in 3 years! Half of that comes back to our

- District for local and District projects and half goes to the world fund for global projects.
- Collaborative projects involving several clubs in our District such as the Strategic Water Alliance or the Guatemala Literacy project. Dolly Pardon Imagination Library (Gloucester, Charlottesville and Louisa)
- Global and Peace Scholars
- Global Grant opportunities (combat human trafficking, buy and outfit ambulances, create access to safe water & sanitation in the Northern Neck/Middle Peninsula)
- Ending polio encourage clubs to take-on a End Polio Now campaign in October – or even become a 100% Polio Plus Society Club for \$100 annually – like the Manassas Club!
- * Making a difference long after we are gone? The District's Legacy Campaign to raise \$1MM in legacy donations by October 2025. \$10,000 outright gifts, spread it over 3 years as a pledges, or through your will with the Bequest Society)
- Enroll in Rotary Direct to fix it and forget it! Whether as a Paul Harris Society member at \$84 a month, or Sustaining Member at \$10 per month or any other figure, consistent donations make all the difference.



Connect Outside Your Club

She discussed the many ways Rotarians can connect outside of their home club:

- Visit other clubs This was more common when Rotary had stricter attenndance rules, but it is still an excellent way to epand your Rotary experience.
- Get engaged with the District Committees (Membership, PI, Foundation, Youth, Emergency Preparedness, etc.)
- ❖ Go to the District or Rotary International learning events and conferences! The magic of our organization is in our members − connect with more of them!!
- District Action Groups are how we connect to our passion to serve!
- Rotary Fellowships the way we gather to do things for fun/hobbies/etc.!

A.B.I.D.E.

DG Amelia discussed the many ways we can enhance the Rotary experience for Rotarians and potential new members with the key word ABIDE.

- Accessible Can your members access the building, restrooms, food, audio, visual, etc.?
- ❖ Belonging Do your members and guests feel welcomed when they come to a meeting or event? Do your members build true friendships? Are they missed when they aren't there? How do they know they are missed? Calls, emails, etc.?
- Inclusive Do you ask members what their interests are and include members in meaningful activities to leverage their skills and interests?
- ❖ Diverse Do you have members of differing backgrounds, races, genders, religions, etc. coming together to identify and solve problems?
- ❖ Equitable What barriers are in the way for members and potential to serve with you? Are they financial, time commitment something else? How can you remove those barriers?

Expand our Reach (Connect to new members in new ways)

DG Amelia discussed ways we can expand our reach by attracting new members and possibly starting new clubs by asking us the following questions{

- Is our own club irresistible to our members?
- Do people want to join?
- Have you sponsored a new member in the past year? Where did you find them? Why did you invite them What did you say to encourage them to come?
- What do you think the reason is that people don't join Rotary? They aren't asked!!
- What does your club experience feel like when a guest comes?
- ❖ Is there a market we are missing? Maybe a Rotary desert nearby? Or an active adult community in your area?
- Public Image and Telling YOUR Story
- ❖ Hone your skills to tell YOUR Rotary Story, when someone asks you why are you in Rotary, what do you say?
- ❖ Wear your Rotary swag with pride!! If you don't have any, get some!
- ❖ Wear your Pin with pride! It represents all of US!!

She then discussed the district Rotaract clubs (UVA, UMW, Vienna). We are starting 4 new Rotaract Clubs: District e-Club & Northern Virginia Rotaract Club for Young Professionals and adding 2 at George Mason University! All clubs should be seeking internship opportunities for Rotaract members

She reminded us of the importance of Rotary Youth Programs - the seeds we plant today to harvest in years to come! We have a rich history of incredible Youth

programs in D7610 that fizzled during Covid – it is time to get that back!

- EarlyAct (kids are on FIRE to serve!)
- Interact / youth conference on April 26th
- * Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is BACK!! Partnering with D-7620 President's Day weekend!
- ❖ Youth Exchange (outbound applications open this Fall and inbound next spring!) get prepared now!
- Youth Contests (Speech, Music and Essay on April 26th)
- ❖ District 7610 needs members to serve on the Youth Services committee!

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Increase Our Ability to Adapt



DG Amelia reminded us that if we're standing still, we're falling behind. Here are some ways to develop as Rotarians.

- Learning & Development (in person and online learning opportunities)
- * Rotary Leadership Institute is recommended for all Rotarians. The next class is coming October 12th!
- ❖ The Learning Center online self-paced learning for role specific, or general leadership.
- District 7610 Toastmasters e-Club to help members with their speaking and listening skills.
- Continuous Improvement model and continuity planning
- Club Leadership Plan, good governance and a vision for the future!
- ❖ Start with a 3-5 year Club Visioning Action Plan. The District and RI have tools to help you do it!

At the end of the meeting Kristy gave the Foundation Minute about Rotary Peace Fellows in Sri Lanka.




