Mark Ross, a George Mason University alumnus, shared his personal story of a lifealtering accident that left him blind. Despite this, he has pursued various interests, including bartending and volunteering. Mark also expressed his passion for acting and directing, and his desire to find a way to continue these pursuits. He also shared his experience working for Holly Volunteers and his involvement with the Rotary Club. Additionally, Mark discussed his role in training Roxy, a guide dog for Holly, and the challenges they face in navigating public spaces. The conversation ended with Mark expressing his desire to find a job closer to his home in Northern Virginia.

Nikki, the Family Relations Coordinator for Stafford County public schools, shared her personal journey with the team. She discussed her background in athletic training, her decision to switch careers after having a child, and her current role in the communications office. She also talked about her three children, her husband's military career, and their recent decision to renovate their home to accommodate her aging parents.. Kristy discussed her journey into Rotary, highlighting her mentorship under Cheri and her current role as the formal liaison between Rotary and Stafford schools.
