

Douglas Heizer, *Boca Raton Tribune* publisher and noted Brazilian-born businessman Douglas Heizer served as the 32nd governor of Rotary District 6930.

first Portuguese-speaking Rotary Club in the U.S. in 2008. The Rotary Club of Boca Raton West is one of four Rotary Clubs in Boca, and members and presidents were well represented at the installation. They also include The Rotary Club of Boca Raton, Rotary Club Downtown Boca Raton and Rotary Club of Boca Raton Sunrise. Heizer created an event that brings all the Rotary Clubs in Boca together to collect toys for unprivileged kids in the area for the last 15 years., the Boca Raton Toy Drive. In 2009, he was honored by the City of Boca Raton, which declared January 13 as Douglas Heizer Day in Boca Raton.

Heizer was president of the Rotary Club Boca Raton Sunset, District 6930 Public Image Chair, Assistant Governor, and District Secretary. A native of Rio De Janeiro, he served as RYLA chair, Assistant Governor, and District secretary at District 4751 in Brazil.

The Heizers moved to the United States in 2000. He has been married to Dini since 1985, and they have three children. He is the President of Heizer Corporation with affiliates worldwide., which owns the newspaper *The Boca Raton Tribune*, and Heizer Marketing, a marketing agency focused on digital marketing and content creation. He also owns Boca Raton FC, a semi-professional soccer team.

Throughout his time in the United States, Douglas has amassed numerous awards, including the Lifetime Achievement Rotary Award, Entrepreneur of the Year by Life Magazine in 2017, Honorary Award in 2017 by the Evangelical Pastors Association, Business Press Award in 2018 by Focus Brasil, and the Milton & Bernice Beckerman Award by Community Publishers.

Rudy Garcia is a business owner from Fluvanna County. He has a tax preparation business and a financial planning business. He was born and raised in Key West, FL. He joined the Army in 1977 and served 22 years. Upon retirement, he worked for the Federal Emergency Management Agency and Fork Union Military Academy until opening his own business in 2006. He and Catherine were married in 2001 and are both multiple time Club Presidents. Rudy Graduated from Ohio University in 2002 with a bachelor's degree in Specialized Studies and in 2005 from Walden University with a master's degree of Science in Education. He joined the Rotary Club of Fluvanna County in 2011 and served as Club President from March of 2013 until June 2016. He also has served as the Interact Club Coordinator and is currently his Club's Executive Secretary. Rudy was recognized as Rotarian of the Year by his Club for 2012.

He and his wife Catherine, who is the current Fluvanna Rotary Club President (and a former two-time President), are both Major Donors Level Two and Bequest Society Level 3 to the Rotary Foundation. Additionally, Rudy and Catherine have both been Paul Harris Society Members since 2014 and they are Multiple Paul Harris Fellows. Rudy has been on the RLI Faculty since 2017 and has also facilitated small group sessions at Chesapeake PETS since 2016. He was also the Multi-District Breakout Sessions Facilitator Coordinator from 2018-2020.

PROGRAM

Our speakers were Joseph Lyttle, Executive Director, and Amanda Strawn: Development Manager of FAHASS – Fredericksburg Area Health and Support Services.

FAHASS is a private, nonprofit organization whose mission is to positively impact individual and community health. They provide a safe environment to learn, grow, and maintain a healthy lifestyle. The staff is dedicated to providing quality service to clients, their families, and to the greater community.

FAHASS started as a support group for people living with HIV and AIDS, and has since expanded to provide HIV programming, community education, and primary healthcare services. They operate in Fredericksburg and serve counties across Virginia, including Westmoreland, King Queen, Fauquier Counties, and the Northern Neck. Services include HIV and prevention education, medical case management, mental health therapy, housing, transportation, and additional support services. They highlighted the importance of early intervention for newly diagnosed HIV patients and the organization's commitment to housing for those living with HIV. The organization operates a primary care facility, Mosaic Care Center, which offers inclusive and affirmant healthcare service.

The new Pride Center is entirely community-supported and serves as a space for LGBQT+ organizations to host events. They discussed their annual fundraiser, the Rainbow Run, and their plans for an annual Community Connections Expo. They expressed the need for more community awareness and support, as their organization relies heavily on government grants and lacks a strong donor base. Cheri suggested connecting with the local Rotary clubs for potential support and collaboration. They also mentioned their transition care services for adults and the potential for pushback or resistance in the coming years.
