


Message from District Governor Nomie Hamid

Together, we can work towards a more peaceful world, honoring our motto: "Service Above Self."



Disaster Update – Los Angeles Area Wildfires

District 7620 Disaster Relief Committee continues to coordinate with Disaster Aid USA to respond to disasters. Recent wildfires in the Los Angeles area is one of the most damaging disasters in the US history. More than 20,000



structures have been destroyed and over 50 people have died. We are helping the first responders by providing disaster relief kits, each costing \$75. To support such relief work, money and supplies are always needed, and we request that you and your club consider donating money to DAUSA. Please see

Los Angeles Wildfires

Our immediate focus has been on supporting first responders by providing disaster relief kits tailored to their urgent needs. These kits are being prepared and packed to ensure rapid deployment of emergency workers to the front lines. The First Responder Disaster Relief Kit has been developed to provide safety equipment to emergency responders. It includes personal protective items, active cooling equipment for rehabilitation, high visibility safety vest, Edge 360 protection glasses, ear plugs w/ carrying case, sub- zero cooling towel, reusable zip ties, hand sanitizer, and drawstring carry bag. These kits are being procured from a wholesale supplier Fire Ninja Safety Equipment at \$75.00 each. This initiative has been made possible through a strong partnership with manufacturers of essential goods and California Rotary Clubs, who have been instrumental in supporting these efforts.

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
the event, from the donation process to the final distribution of toys.

Historic Ellsworth Cemetery Cleanup

The flag court at Westminster's historic Ellsworth Cemetery has been cleaned and spruced up thanks to members of the Rotary Club of Bonds Meadow.

The Westminster club learned that the flag court, in the 148-year-old cemetery on Leidy Road, desperately needed a transformation.

"Over the years weather, vandals, and general neglect caused historic tombstones to be damaged or destroyed, the flag court to be overgrown with weeds, and the



wooden fence to be unsightly," David A. Highfield, a charter member of the club stated in an email. "The Rotary Club members, along with other service organizations and Westminster citizens, began to care for the cemetery.


"Rotary members cleaned up the flag court, donated a new flag pole, and stained the fences," he said.

The Ellsworth Cemetery is the final resting place for many prominent Black residents of Carroll County. It was founded on Dec. 21, 1876.

The cemetery's founders intended to provide a burial place "for the Colored residents of Westminster, Maryland," according to its website. The Westminster Cemetery had covenants at the time that prohibited the burial of African Americans, although some enslaved people were buried with their enslavers there. Read More

Post-independence, this commitment intensified. Successive governments, regardless of political ideology, championed education. The Kerala Education Act of 1958 set high standards, while land reforms created a more equitable society where education could flourish.

The Kerala Model: Education for All

What makes Kerala's approach unique? It's a combination of factors that together create a powerful formula for success:

- 1. **Inclusive Education**: Heavy investment in public education ensures accessibility for all communities.
- 2. **Women's Empowerment**: Kerala's historically matrilineal society contributed to higher status for women and equal educational opportunities.
- 3. **Community Participation**: Literacy campaigns were driven by massive volunteer efforts, creating a culture of learning.
- 4. **Lifelong Learning**: Adult education programs and an extensive network of public libraries promote continuous learning.
