


Message from District Governor Nomie Hamid



Disaster Update – Year 2024 Saw Most Damaging Hurricanes

District 7620 Disaster Relief Committee continues to coordinate with Disaster Aid USA to respond to disasters caused by hurricanes, tornadoes, and floods. The year 2024 saw the most damaging hurricanes. Currently we are helping the



flood victims in Greeneville, TN, affected by Hurricane Helene. To support such relief work, money and supplies are always needed, and we request that you and your club consider donating money to DAUSA. Please see below a summary of various disasters of 2024, and how our Rotary District, in coordination with DAUSA helped the victims of these disasters.

Tennessee Tornadoes: Between January 2 and 6, 2024 we coordinated with an Ohio team to deploy at Tennessee. A four-member team led by DAUSA's Dave Roasa conducted disaster relief work around Madison, TN. A group of 8 homes were selected for doing clean-up work and tree clearing. The team visited Springfield Rotary Club and coordinated with the club for relief work. That town was also affected by the Tornadoes. The team also worked with Hendersonville Evening Rotary Club for further coordination in that area.

Hurricane Beryl: Hurricane Beryl swept through Caribbean islands, Mexico, and US Gulf coast, leaving a trail of devastation in its wake, many of these communities are still facing unimaginable hardships. Disaster AidUSA was on the front lines, providing immediate relief and long-term support to those affected by the hurricane. Multiple teams worked tirelessly to deliver essential services. From RID 7620, District Disaster Relief Committee member, Vijay Kowtha, took the initiative and traveled to the Houston area with four of his students in the week of July 22 to help the Hurricane victims there. We thank Vijay for volunteering.

Hurricane Debby & Tornadoes - Harrisburg, PA: While the city workers removed larger trees toppled by a tornado, a group of DAUSA volunteers did cleanup of trees at Harrisburg's Bellevue Park neighborhood. Steve Nuckles and Russ Koon, two DAUSA team leaders, coordinated the efforts in Harrisburg to clean up the damage. Local volunteers and Rotarians were given some protective equipment available at the DAUSA trailer stationed there; and they helped pile up some of the more manageable branches and brush that had littered the backyards of homes and neighborhood streets.

Tornadoes - Northeast Ohio: DAUSA team and volunteers were able to help 9 homeowners. Dave Roasa and other volunteers (all of Grove City Rotary Club, OH) spent three days cleaning up debris and removing downed trees. Our thanks to Dale Smith who is DG of Rotary District 6630; Dale not only worked with the team for a couple of days, but also put the word out to the Rotarians in his District. The DAUSA team also got day-volunteer assistance from Rotary Clubs of Chagrin Valley, Chagrin Highlands, Burton Middlefield, Akron, Geauga West, and Chardon. What great support from Ohio Rotarians!

Plenty"


Members and families from Key City Rotary in Frederick served up "Keys to Thanksgiving Plenty" two ways last week:
