atanel Vaninger and Hila Ziva, visiting from
Israeli as part of the JFEC emissary program, spoke
to our club. Their talk focused on "Israel: Before and
After 10/7"

The two young people gave a bit of biographical information about themselves. Both live on Moshavs, which are a type of Israeli village, a cooperative agricultural community. Natanel lives on one between Nazareth and Afula, and Hila on one near Tel Aviv. Both like to travel and hike.

Turning to their main presentation, they told us a bit about their homeland. Its geography, innovations and lifestyle. Then they turned to October 7th. Hila chronicled the Hamas invasion. Their atrocities against innocent people. The destruction they caused and the hostages they took. 37 of them were 18 years old or younger. She spoke of the NOVA music festival where many were killed or taken hostage. She had a personal connection to the events. Israel is a small country. You can drive it in less than a day. It's a place she said, where "everybody knows everybody." She had two friends murdered at the festival by Hamas.

Natanel had a friend evacuated from a city in the north, bombed and burning. His father and uncle were both called back to military service. Neither Natanel or Hila have done their mandatory service yet, but will when they return to their homeland. They wanted to be emissaries to offer Americans a different perspective on Israel. Especially from those often presented on social platforms, which are not always accurate.

They next spoke about the aftermath of October 7 and the war it sparked. In New York, they encountered anti-Israel protests that made them fearful because they were Israeli Jews. They cited statistics showing a 37% increase in antisemitism. Worldwide, Jews have begun to fear for their lives. They explained that not all Jews are connected to Israel, and that Hamas' terrorism is not always connected to Palestinians.

They shared some of the impacts of October 7. Many foreign agricultural workers left Israel, which has really affected the

production of food. International boycotts over the war have hurt the economy.

More hopefully, the "Unity & Solidarity" movement has taken hold. 50% of the country has volunteered to help in some way. Students and soldiers have volunteered to help farmers. Some have opened their houses to those fleeing the war. Natanel's 14-year-old sister is calling around to find who needs help. His mother, a nurse, is aiding in the Moshav. His father is working a security patrol. Others have helped clean bomb shelters. Packed food. Helped people find housing.



Natanel and Hila then showed some powerful images of places in Israel before and after the October 7th invasion. Villages now ruined homes. Burned out facilities. Once busy meeting places deserted. They showed a display of blindfolded teddy bears — one for each hostage. Natanel and Hila said they can longer go to their favorite places to hike. They are too dangerous. They might encounter a terrorist. Israel is a country traumatized. Socially. Economically. It will take a long time to recover, and, they fear, it may never fully recover.

When asked how one could help, they reiterated that one of the ongoing fights is against misinformation, fake news, propaganda. They urged us to check our sources when we seek out news. Do research on the validity of what we find before we believe it and share it. It is easy to spread hate — we need to fight it. It seemed good advice, not just for our perspectives on Israel, but for all events.

Natanel and Hila said their experiences in America have been good. They were touched by the support they received after October 7th, especially from the Jewish community. It was heart-warming. They really valued the connections they'd made to people here.

As always, the Israeli emissaries' visit was a chance to see the world through the eyes of others. Natanel Vaninger and Hila Ziva personalized the events of October 7th. When the news moves from our TVs to two young people standing in our midst, telling us their experiences and sharing their perspectives, we begin to understand the human toll of distant events. What we do with that understanding is up to us.
