"OPUS FOR PEACE" PART OF LONG ROTARY PEACE-BUILDING HISTORY

Rotary's current peace initiative may seem daunting or confusing at first glance - just how does one Rotary club foster world peace? In reality peace begins in individual communities and in efforts to bring people together, building ties and bonds that lead to greater understanding, safer neighborhoods, an improved business climate and a more equitable sharing of resources.

The program at the New London Rotary club's regular meeting on Aug. 8 strove to explain the peace initiative, including the district's "Opus for Peace" that aims to foster peace through the arts. The program also reviewed the events and programs already planned and considered other ways the club can be a peace-building group.

Rotarian Julia Kushigian-Secor, who is part of the club's peace committee, urged members to participate in Rotary International's Institute for Peace. The online institute features a series of short videos that provide an overview of the initiative, but also provide some concrete ideas for ways to build peace locally. Among activities planned locally are an Aug. 15 gallery talk by artist and Rotarian Marvin Espy, a Sept. 17 panel discussion at the Public Library of New London, the Sept. 21 International Day of Peace that will feature the unveiling of the club's portable peace pole, a peace-building project that will connect the local club with one in Haifa, Israel, and a planned peace film series. The library panel focuses on Kushigian-Secor's book "The Resilient Apocalypse" as it relates to peace and the gallery talk on Espy's exhibition "Up From the Asphalt."

In addition to events and programming, Kushigian-Secor, Jerry Fischer, Gail MacDonald and Mary Lenzini reviewed and explained pieces of the overall peace initiative.

With the roots of Rotary in the business community, Fischer talked about the intersection of peace and economic well-being. While negative peace is the absence of active violent conflicts such as wars, positive peace that incorporates a sound business environment and an effective government requires some work to maintain, but ultimately is more resilient.

War not only causes death, injury and property destruction, it also requires a tremendous amount of money to support military personnel and equipment. Kushigian-Secor said the least peaceful countries spend as much as 34% of their gross domestic products on the military, while the most peaceful countries spend as little as 2.9%.

MacDonald reviewed the eight pillars on which positive peace is built. These are: a well functioning government, a sound business environment, low levels of corruption, equitable distribution of resources, good relations with neighbors, a free flow of information, high levels of human capital and the acceptance of the rights of others. Building positive peace, which is future oriented, requires stimulating all eight pillars at once or focusing on boosting the weakest among the pillars.

Lenzini reviewed some of the history of how Rotary has long been involved with peace-building. For example, Rotary was instrumental in the formation of the United Nations organization UNESCO (United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization). Rotarians also have served in many top leadership capacities at the UN.

In 1914, the Rotary convention adopted a resolution pledging support to maintaining peace and just after World War I, the 1921 convention added a section to the Rotary constitution saying the organization would aid in the advancement of world peace. The 1940 convention in Havana, Cuba adopted a resolution to advance human rights for all.

Lenzini also pointed to the seven focus areas of Rotary grants and showed that they interconnect with peace-building. These areas include promoting literacy and education, improving access to clean water, respecting the environment and aiding in maternal and child health.

Kushigian-Secor invited club members to get involved in the club's peace building committee to help brainstorm and carry out peace-building events locally and also to participate in the online institute to fully appreciate the scope of the initiative.
