Local families in need will again be treated to free Thanksgiving dinners thanks to Liberty Bank and New London Rotary.

Pam McNulty-Hennessey is again overseeing for New London Rotary the 21st annual drive. The Community Foundation of Eastern Connecticut also has contributed to the drive, as will shoppers at some local food markets. The Liberty Bank Foundation also will contribute 25 cents for every dollar donated, up to \$200,000.

New London Rotary's donations will benefit the New London Community Meal Center, Gemma E. Moran United Way/Labor Food Center and Salvation Army, all located in the city.

World Polio Day

lub Member **Kris** Magnussen spoke to us on World Polio Day, the day that honors Jonas Salk's birthday. Salk developed the first vaccine against Polio in 1955. Some of us can remember the fear of polio that could cause spinal and respiratory paralysis. One out of two-hundred people who contracted polio became paralyzed. People avoided crowds, fairs, swimming pools and other public places, especially in late summer and fall when the virus was most active. Our time dealing with Covid



was a vivid reminder of the toll a virus can take.

In 1955 there were 29,000 cases of poliomyelitis in the U.S. Two years after implementation of the vaccine, the infection rate plummeted to less than 6,000.

When we think of polio we envision leg braces and the iron lung. The last living person in an iron lung died this year at the age of 78.

Polio has been eradicated in most countries, but unfortunately Afghanistan and Pakistan continue to see outbreaks primarily due to the fundamentalists who feel that immunizations are a Western plot to kill them. It was eradicated in the US in 1979 but there was a case in Rockland County, NY in 2022. He was a 20-year-old Hungarian who came to the U.S. He had been vaccinated abroad before he came here.

The first vaccine developed by Jonas Salk was an injection, but there was such a demand by the public with long, long lines that a Dr. Sabin developed an oral vaccine that was much easier and faster to give. Kris asked how many of us remembered getting a sugar cube with the polio vaccine in school? The vaccine tasted so bitter it was put on sugar cubes so kids would take it. The oral polio vaccine is the choice when doing campaigns such as in Gaza as it is easy to give, doesn't require training, and is cheap at around \$3 per dose. In 1988 the World Health Assembly adopted a resolution for worldwide eradication of polio: the Global Polio Eradication Initiative that included the WHO, Rotary International, CDC, UNICEF and national governments. They have reduced polio cases by 99.9% since their first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979. Rotary has contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

As always, international conflicts have affected the situation. Polio was found in wastewater in Gaza in June and they had their first confirmed case in 25 years a few months later. As 90% of the population is displaced and healthcare and

infrastructure are destroyed, there is an increase risk of polio and other infectious diseases. There was a pause in fighting to allow healthcare workers to vaccinate



640,000 kids under 10 years with the oral polio vaccine. Unfortunately, they did not reach their goal. They had planned another push to vaccinate, but it was put on hold due to the increase violence, bombardment and displacement of the population. To prevent the transmission of polio, at least 90% of the population needs to be vaccinated with 3 doses. Israel should be concerned about polio in Gaza as 17% of Israel's population is ultra-orthodox and are exempt from Israel's vaccination requirements. Should the virus take hold it will spread like wildfire. Science can find solutions to many health problems. But it takes more. It takes governments and aid groups and popular acceptance to truly eradicate a disease that can take an enormous human toll.

Kris added a final note of interest: Mary Harkness in 1952 deeded what is now known as Camp Harkness to the State of Connecticut for perpetual use of those stricken with polio.
