Local families in need will again be treated to free Thanksgiving dinners thanks to Liberty Bank and New London Rotary.

Pam McNulty-Hennessey is again overseeing for New London Rotary the 21st annual drive. The Community Foundation of Eastern Connecticut also has contributed to the drive, as will shoppers at some local food markets. The Liberty Bank Foundation also will contribute 25 cents for every dollar donated, up to \$200,000.

New London Rotary's donations will benefit the New London Community Meal Center, Gemma E. Moran United Way/Labor Food Center and Salvation Army, all located in the city.

## Rotary projects around the globe

### Kenya

Recognizing the importance of sleep to child development, the Rotary Club of Nairobi delivered bed kits for 8,000 school children in 2024, a milestone in a long-running project. Over the past 16 years, the club has partnered with Toronto-based charity Sleeping Children Around the World to supply bed kits to a total of 80,000 children at a cost of about \$4 million, says club member Mumbi King. Each kit includes a mat or mattress, bedding, and mosquito netting, along with school supplies and clothing. The kits have an outsize influence on children's lives, since better sleep improves health and school performance, King says. Twenty Nairobi Rotarians mobilized for the five-day delivery mission in February, serving the town of Naro Moru at the base of Mount Kenya and other villages, including in the Maasai Mara region. "The heat couldn't keep the team from visiting the villages and interacting with the families," says King.

## Veteran's Day & Rep. Anthony Nolan



fter a spirited singing of the anthems of the various branches of the armed forces, **Representative**Anthony Nolan spoke to us about service as someone who has served in the military, the police force, and the state legislature.



In keeping with our celebration of Veteran's Day, Nolan focused his talk on his time in the Navy. He joined the Navy in the 1990s, and said it was a turning point in his life. He did not tell friends and family of his intent to join. He saw it as a way to escape some of the turmoil that surrounded him at that time. Some of the bad influences. He did not want to become another statistic. Join the Navy, he said, was the best thing he ever did. Basic training was life-changing. It was a time to confront and conquer physical and mental challenges, including homesickness. Being away really made him appreciate family and friends. In the Navy, he learned to be more than about himself. He learned about service, sacrifice, dedication, honor, respect, integrity, trust and courage. All would be lifelong values that would inform his careers in public service. He served eight and a half years in the Navy.

Anthony told us he learned how to agree to disagree with others who had different ideas and opinions. He learned how to stand up for what is right. He learned to respect leaders and members of the team he was on. He may not share their points of view; he may not like them. But his life might depend on them and theirs on him. So getting along and understanding how to work with others, how to find common ground came to inform his work in the Navy, and later his work on the police force and in government. He understood how we can be united when we share a mission.

Anthony worked on the New London police force for twenty-three years. He was a four-time member of the New London city council and served a term as its president. He is a deacon at the Shiloh Baptist church. Youth advocacy is a major interest and focus of his volunteer work. He has received many awards for his public service. He is now serving his third term as a state representative.

Representative Nolan said that service means we must put aside personal needs to focus on a bigger mission. He said that discipline, effective time management, and problemsolving are important in his job as a state representative. Likewise, meeting challenges under pressure. He tries to embrace opportunities to grow even when they are outside his comfort zone. He said he is still growing.



At Rotary, we talk about service above self. Representative Nolan's life has certainly fulfilled that goal. In the military, on the police force, in his volunteer work and as part of state government, Anthony Nolan has served others for the greater good.
