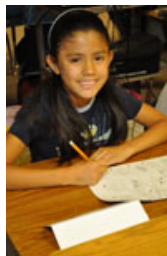

Gerry H was called upon to introduce guest speaker Dr. Renee Coffman. Dr. Coffman is co-founder and current CEO of Roseman University, which was established in 1999, as a private, not-for-profit educational institution. Current enrollment has reached 1,400, at the three campuses, Henderson, Summerlin and South Jordan, UT.

The University's business model has enabled them to reinvest earnings into new programs. Today, according to Dr. Coffman, Roseman University has Colleges of Pharmacy, Nursing, Dental Medicine, and an MBA program. Plans are well underway to start a College of Medicine at the former Nevada Cancer Institute Foundation Building in Summerlin. Dr. Mark Penn has been named the founding dean. Sixty students will launch the program in the fall, 2017. The College is projected to grow to 480 students and 200 full time employees. Coffman projected that the College will have a positive economic impact to the community.

Pres Jack thanked Dr. Coffman for her informative presentation, before Lauren asked her to draw the day's raffle ticket. The drawn ticket belonged to Don Havens, who in turn pulled a face card from the deck, winning \$10. Don led the Club in reciting the Four Way Test before the meeting was adjourned at 8:15.
