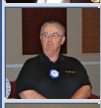

Professor of Business

Program: Update on Lee Business School and business
trends for 2015.

Brent Hathaway became dean and Ted and Doris Lee
Professor of Business in the Lee Business School on Oct. 1,
2013. He joined UNLV from the University of Wyoming

College of Business where he served as dean for nine years and previously
served as interim dean and chair of the management and marketing
department.

He co-founded the Wyoming Business Leadership Institute, created an online
executive MBA program and college-based career center, and enhanced
graduate programs with an emphasis on energy and sustainability. He also
raised more than \$50 million for facility upgrades.

In addition to academic leadership, Hathaway has extensive experience in the
business sector. He served in several executive positions including vice
president of marketing and sales for aerospace services at Honeywell
International and director of marketing for agricultural equipment at Case
Corporation.

Hathaway earned a Ph.D. in business administration from the University of
Illinois, a master's degree in agricultural economics from Purdue University, and
a bachelor's degree in agricultural economics from Utah State University. He
has published and presented widely about entrepreneurship, leadership,
business sustainability, ethics and the economy.

The weekly meeting of the Rotary Club of Green Valley (RCGV) was a special “off-campus” gathering at the Silverado High School (SHS). Rotarians and guests were greeted by an enthusiastic welcoming party consisting of the Silverado HS Interact Club Officers and members of the school staff. Accompanying the Interactors were Faculty Advisors Melanie Pavlides and Helen Wolcott.

President Jack Ewing convened the meeting at 7:00 AM, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Rotarians, guests, school employees, Interact students and staff enjoyed some good camaraderie while devouring some impressive breakfast choices prepared by the SHS Culinary School. The Culinary School is part of the school’s Career & Technical Education (CTE) Program.



SHS Principal Robert Mars gave an enthusiastic introductory presentation to our club members. He elaborated on such new initiatives and programs as Silverado’s designation as the only “Select Schools” program institution in the South Eastern part of this region. He also discussed the “Jobs for Americas” program as a highly successful initiative for special students. Principal Mars announced that business leaders are needed for volunteer participation, advice, and assistance to the “Academy Advisory Board”. SHS is also seeking internships in the private sector for juniors

and seniors.



Faculty Interact Advisors Melanie Pavlides and Helen Wolcott followed Principal Mars. Initial remarks by Ms. Pavlides and Ms. Wolcott about the Interact Club were both motivational and inspirational. Their belief in the ideals of Rotary International and their abilities to implement these key principles within their Interact Club are exemplary. The students fully embrace the precept of “Service Above Self” in their club projects and activities and Interact

members are using the “Four Way Test” as a model for individual interactions with others.

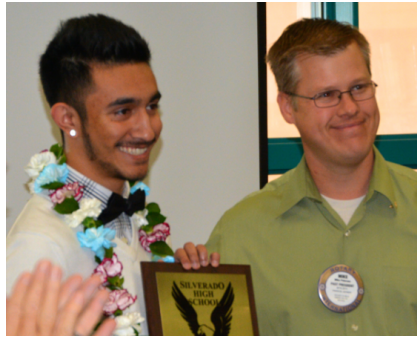


The Officers of the Interact Club were then introduced. Each gave a presentation on his or her Interact Club responsibilities and work efforts. The presentations were well prepared and articulated. The key community service initiative of the SHS Interact Club has been, and will continue to be, the Gene Ward School gift program for needy children. This year, the club bought and wrapped 841 toys. Fundraising and logistical efforts for the Gene Ward program have become more challenging as the elementary school continues to grow. The students then showed a wonderful video of their latest Gene Ward School effort. As they would say, it was “totally awesome”. One big kid who has actively assisted with Gene Ward is our very own Santa, Jon Hoolihan.

Past Pres Mike Peterson then introduced our Student of the Month, Cyrus Ghaffari. Cyrus is a SHS senior, and he has earned a combined 4.8 Grade Point Average with his Advanced Placement bonus credits. He is presently ranked first in his class of 462 students. Many laudatory remarks from teachers and coaches were



read. Among them was a statement given by Ms. Pavlides who noted that Cyrus is an exceptional member of the Interact Club. As Ms. Pavlides said, he has made the school community a better place because of his "Service Above Self" attitude. In addition to his many academic and service accomplishments, Cyrus has attained recognition as an outstanding athlete in track and field.



Cyrus was recognized with a plaque and gift certificate by Mike P. and Pres Jack E. Cyrus gave an emotional statement of gratitude to Rotary and our club specifically.

Pres Jack then presented Principal Mars with a check for \$1,500.00. This money will be used for the creation of a school garden that will be beneficial to special education and autistic children and the culinary students for use in food preparation. It will be a sustainable initiative,

An announcement was made by Pres Jack about the Souper Bowl of Caring program for Saturday, January 31.
