Jim, a former broadcaster and newspaper man, came to Southern Nevada about two years ago. According to Jim, it is no longer illegal to have a desert tortoise.
The Tortoise Group is the only adoption agency in Southern Nevada for these endangered animals. The Group is

hoping to expand the number of adoptions, up from three in 2012, to 23 in 2013, and to 72 in 2014. They are hoping 100 will be adopted in 2015. There is a \$75 adoption fee, and it is required that the adopting family have a fenced yard as well as a fence around any existing pool or pond. The cold blooded desert tortoise burrows, and it hibernates in winter. Currently the Tortoise Group is building a new shelter in North Las Vegas.

According to Jim, there are five desert tortoise species. The local species is found in Nevada, Arizona, Utah, and California. It grows to about an 18 inch diameter. Desert Tortoises live 80-100 years, and inbreeding is a danger.

The Tortoise Group educates those wishing to adopt, and it educates in schools and institutions, attempting to increase population. "We spread the word on adoption, diet, care, backyard requirements for adoption, and breeding," he explained. "Threats to the desert tortoise include human developments, off road vehicles, ravens and other predators, and brightly colored plastic, which the tortoise will mistake for food."

Following Cornwall's presentation, the drawing was held. Guest Rotarian Arno B's number was called, and Arno drew a face card, winning \$10. Arno led the Club in reciting the Four Way Test before adjournment.
