Janet said that she thinks the greatest thing about RYLA is the way that Rotary teaches resiliency techniques. Kathy Buckley and others showed the power of the human spirit. Janet showed some spunk herself at camp, riding the zip line and successfully climbing the rock wall.

A program filled with the sharing of Rotary moments concluded with the drawing and with the members reciting the Four Way Test.
