Presenter: Ward I - Councilwoman Gerri Schroder

Topic: Updates on the City of Henderson parks, safety, awards, finances, and development throughout the city.

Gerri Schroder was elected at large to the Henderson City Council in April 2007 and re-elected in April 2011, representing Ward I. Councilwoman Schroder serves with the Mayor and fellow council members as the legislative

branch of the Henderson community, responsible for setting policies and making decisions concerning many different aspects of local government. The City Council also approves the city's budget.

Gerri was named Mayor pro tempore in July 2014. In addition to serving on the city Ethics Committee, the Mayor pro tempore performs the duties of Mayor during the absence or disability of the Mayor.

As Councilwoman, Gerri represents the city on the Southern Nevada Regional Planning Coalition, Workforce Connections and the Clark County School District Oversight Committee on School Facilities. She serves as the council representative on the City of Henderson Cultural Arts and Tourism Commission and is a member of the Henderson Development Association and the Henderson Redevelopment Agency. Gerri also serves on the Governor's Workforce Investment Board Manufacturing Sector Council and the Mining and Materials Sector Council.

Gerri was appointed to the National League of Cities (NLC) 2015 Community and Economic Development Steering Committee where she will assist in the development of NLC federal policy positions on issues involving housing, community and economic development, land use, recreation and parks, historic preservation and international competitiveness. She previously served on the NLC's First Tier Suburbs Council and Policy and Advocacy Committee on Economic Development.

She received the Distinguished Endeavor Award for Government in 2014 from Distinguished Women in Nevada. In 2008, Gerri was named Elected Official of the Year by the Asian Chamber of Commerce and in 2011 she received the Public Official of the Year

Program Chair Gerry Holinski introduced our speaker of the day, Shannon Moore, from the American Cancer Society(ACS). She told us that we have 14.5 million cancer survivors in the U.S. today. One in two men and one in three women will confront cancer during their lifetimes. Most donations to ACS go toward research. ACS is second only to the U.S. government in funding cancer research. The most common cancer in Nevada is skin cancer. The Relay for Life in Henderson is ACS's big fund raiser. Local programs beyond research include Road To Recovery (free rides to and from treatment), cosmetic help including wigs, navigation through the treatment process, free lodging for people from rural areas, education in evaluation. and prevention. E&P promotes not smoking, diet and exercise; things that really work in avoiding cancer or improving treatment. Shannon noted strong support from local Rotary clubs, mentioning in particular the Boulder City and Pahrump clubs. What an informative program!

Past Pres Jack Ewing conducted the raffle. Debbie Mitsch was the winner, drawing a modest four, but then doing a masterful job of leading us in recitation of the 4-Way Test to bring the meeting to a close.

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards a Winner For Local High School Students

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is an intensive, two-and-a-half-day leadership training program for high school juniors (of District 5300) chosen for their leadership potential. In addition to the development of leadership skills, RYLA is meant to develop understanding of Rotary among youth participants and reinforce and provide recognition for their efforts, accomplishments, skills and potential as leaders. Rotarians serve as facilitators to the students' learning and discovery, as well as role models of Rotary ideals of the Four Way Test and Service Above Self.

But that's the clinical explanation. I'm here to add to that it is an absolute blast for all of us. For many Rotarians, RYLA provided that initial "Rotary moment" and it is one that they will never forget. RYLA allows for an intergenerational great time. Last year one student described it as epic.

Some of the "labs" (student exercises throughout the weekend) help students discover creative approaches for resolving family, social and professional conflicts. Ethics and team building are a big part of these labs. Here's the cool thing...all the students are treated (and recognized) as equals.
