Speaker: Jerald Burkin

Program: FBI, White Collar Crime and Fraud.

Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) agent Jerald Burkin will present a program on White Collar Crime. These crimes are characterized by deceit, concealment or violation of trust. The motivation behind these crimes is financial. Today's fraud schemes are sophisticated, and the FBI is dedicated to tracking down the culprits and stopping the scams before they start. FBI special agents partner with law enforcement and regulatory agencies such as the Internal Revenue Service, the Commodity Futures Trading Commission, and the Security and Exchange Commission.

Money Laundering is the process by which criminals conceal their proceeds and make the money appear to have come from legitimate sources. Money laundering allows criminals to hide wealth, avoid prosecution, evade taxes, increase profits through reinvestment, and fund further criminal activity.

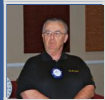

Pres Dave called on Program Chair Gerry Holinski to introduce our program, Pinecrest Academy Principal and State Senate Candidate, Dr. Carrie Buck. Dr. Buck was formerly principal of CT Sewell Elementary in Henderson. Presently, she is principal of one of the four Pinecrest Charter Schools.

Dr. Buck, herself, a parent of a former CT Sewell student, said that she was embarrassed that Sewell's needs were difficult to address under the regular public school framework. "Sewell is still an excellent school, but the parents are required to send their children to the school which serves the area ub which they reside. Charter Schools are not- for-profit public schools which offer specializations and more autonomy of curriculum. There are no residential boundaries for charter schools and families may select a charter school which is compatible to the child's specific, individual needs and goals. There are 6,700 charter schools across the nation educating 2.9 million children. According to Dr. Buck, Charter schools provide more accountability and individuation than traditional public schools do.

Dr. Buck believes that charter schools can improve Nevada student performance, and charter schools might better prepare students for college or career. Currently, Nevada's schools have only a 59.2% graduation rate. Nevada schools are ranked 49th in the nation. Only 43% of Las Vegas graduates go on to attend college. The first Charter schools began in 1991.

Following her presentation, Dr. Buck drew George Baggott's ticket from the raffle tickets. George pulled a 10 from the deck of cards winning \$10. The meeting was dismissed at 8:20 a.m.

Rotary Youth Exchange Fund Raiser Succeeds in Raising Funds
