Dr. Renee Coffman, President and Co-founder Roseman University of Health Sciences

Don Havins introduced Dr. Renee Coffman, President and Co-founder Roseman University. She outlined the presence Roseman University has in Nevada and Utah, but especially in Las Vegas where it was founded in 1999. Celebrating their 20th Anniversary this year, Roseman University has responded and continues to respond to the need for medical personnel in Las Vegas.

Roseman University s founders approach learning in a different way: their six-point Mastery Learning Model has helped students attain high levels of achievement. Roseman is one of two notfor-profit universities based in Nevada. Areas of study include: DPharm/MBS, Nursing, Orthodontics, Dentistry and an affiliation with Cure 4 the Kids, for pediatric oncology treatment. Roseman s Nursing Program has a special support system for Veterans transitioning from their military service and help approximately 12 veterans each year. The Henderson Campus features a Neighborhood Health Series. On March

20th, they will present an evening focusing on ALS and on April 10th, the program will be on Drug Discovery. More information can be found on the Roseman University website: www.roseman.edu

Rotary International News

A year after Hurricane Maria tore through Puerto Rico, local Rotary members continue to rebuild homes and lives

With 155 mph winds and torrential rains, Maria was the strongest hurricane to hit the island in more than 80 years. Mayag ez, Puerto Rico is home to 75,000 people and to the island second-oldest Rotary club after San Juan. In the past, the club carried out smaller projects, but the massive devastation caused by Maria motivated members to do more to help their neighbors, especially the very poor.



and I ve never seen so much help come from other Rotary clubs, Rotarian Orlando Carlo says. After Hurricane Maria, clubs across the United States wired the Rotary Club of Mayag ez about \$50,000 directly; more than half of that money came from the Rotary Club of La Jolla Golden Triangle in California and a group of clubs

in New York. As club treasurer, Rivera keeps track of every receipt and sends updates back to the donor clubs. A year after Maria, the club had helped 22 families repair their homes, mostly replacing roofs that were blown off by the hurricane.
