Taking Flight With Rotary



District Conference 2015 April 17-18 at the Hope Hotel

The Friday portion of our District Conference will focus on aviation. Our Friday keynote speaker is former astronaut and Space Shuttle pilot Gregory H. Johnson. Johnson is the President and Executive Director for the Center for the Advance of Science in Space (CASIS). As Executive Director, Johnson is responsible for leading the CASIS staff to maximize utilization of the International Space Station (ISS) to benefit life here on Earth. CASIS identifies innovative applications and develops new partnership opportunities to promote utilization of our nation's orbiting laboratory.

Prior to CASIS, Johnson was a decorated officer and pilot with the United States Air Force. He flew 34 combat missions in support of Operation Desert Storm and 27 missions during Operation Southern Watch. In 1994, he became a test pilot at Edwards Air Force Base, where he flew and tested the F-15C/E, NF-15B and several other aircraft. Retiring as a Colonel after nearly 25 years in the U.S. Air Force, Johnson has logged over 5,000 flight hours in more than 50 different aircraft.

In 1998, Johnson was selected as a NASA Astronaut and ultimately piloted two Space Shuttle missions (STS-123 and STS-134, both aboard Space Shuttle Endeavour) where he spent nearly 32 days in orbit and contributed to the assembly of the ISS. In October 2011, he began a rotational assignment as the Associate Director of External Programs at NASA Glenn Research Center in Cleveland, Ohio. In that role, Johnson managed all public affairs, outreach and educational programs

Becoming a More Effective Rotarian

How strong is your Rotary knowledge? Do you know the ins and outs of the funding opportunities offered by the Rotary International Foundation? Are you familiar with the differences between leading a business and leading volunteer efforts? Are you moving into a position of leadership in your club? A great way to develop the knowledge and leadership training to make you more successful in Rotary leadership is to attend Rotary Leadership Institute classes.

Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) provides a unique opportunity for Rotarians to become more familiar with the workings of Rotary, thereby becoming more effective and more committed leaders. RLI is

an interesting group - not an official Rotary program, it is a grassroots leadership development program that operates in districts throughout the world. Any Rotarian can attend, but since clubs are expected to pay the RLI attendance fee, it is suggested that clubs select engaged members who are moving into leadership positions—not just presidents, but board members, other officers, committee chairs-in fact, anyone involved, or with the potential to be involved, in any leadership capacity in his or her club.

So many of us started out as general members with little knowledge of how Rotary really works. Attendance at RLI can accelerate the process of "Rotarization," helping you toward a more satisfying experience in Rotary by giving you a thorough understanding of how things work. In addition, while many of us are leaders in our businesses, leadership of volunteers is a much different experience. RLI provides important training in how to work with fellow members to accomplish important projects.

RLI is offered in three parts, each of which builds on the previous level. Each level consists of a daylong training session conducted by past District Governors, selected past Presidents, and past RI Directors. The next RLI classes to be held in District 6670 will be on November 15 and will take place at the Greene County Career Center Adult Education building in Xenia. All three parts will be offered, so if you have previously taken parts I or II, you will be able to move on to the next level—Save the Date! More information will be coming.

So, if you are currently in club leadership, look for those rising, potential new leaders among your members. If you're interested in learning more about Rotary and enhancing your leadership skills, ask your club to consider sending you to a class. RYLA

Each spring, local Rotary Clubs partner with local school districts to select one or more High School sophomores and juniors (Award Winners) to attend a leadership development program known as RYLA, which stands for Rotary Youth Leadership Awards.

This camp is a terrific 48 hour Leadership training event for your Award Winners. In 2015, the program is scheduled from April 10-12, 2015. The location is Camp Kern YMCA Leadership & Conference Center in Oregonia OH.



This Camp is part of Rotary's New Generations initiative to engage Rotarians in the lives of developing youth. The Leadership Camp will feature several outdoor challenges, critical thinking exercises, and motivational speakers. Students will need to come prepared for physical activity and be dressed appropriately (April weather can be challenging). They are also required to attend the ENTIRE ENTIREcamp. Please note: 100% of the cost of the camp is covered by your sponsoring Rotary Club. It is a special honor and opportunity for students who receive this RYLA award. We want to to make the most of this opportunity, for an extremely low cost to your club. Use it to promote your club! Use it to engage club memebrs in working with youth!

We have 52 Rotary Clubs within our District 6670 in southwest Ohio, so this program pulls a cross section of students from many school districts. Last year, over 50 Ohio High Schools were represented.

We will only accept 100 students for this program. The important items to remember are:

- We only have 100 spots
- Students must arrive between 12:30 and 1:00pm on April 10, and should be picked up at 12 noon on April 12 (Closing Ceremony starts at 11:15am)
- Registration is due by March 1, 2015
- The students have to commit to attend the ENTIRE camp
- Students can be transported to and from Camp Kern by Rotarians, or family members, but are not permitted to drive themselves. No student cars are allowed at Camp Kern for safety purposes and liability reasons
- The students need to dress appropriate for outdoor activities
- Cabins are separated by male/female and are supervised at all times by male and female volunteer Rotary Advisors

On Friday, December 19th, this 2 month effort was concluded when we delivered needed food items, holiday meals, and wrapped Christmas presents directly to each family's home.
