year is the 20th anniversary of the Dayton Peace Talks, which resulted in the agreement that brougn peace to Bosnia. The Hope Hotel and Conference Center was the site of these talks. To honor this historic occasion, our Saturday program will focus on peace. Author Paul K. Chappell, a noted peace auhor, will be our opening speaker on Saturday morning. Paul graduated from West Point in 2002, was deployed to Iraq, and left active duty in November 2009 as a Captain.

He is the author of the Road to Peace series, a seven-book series about waging peace, ending war, the art of living, and what it means to be human. The first four published books in this series are <u>Will War</u> <u>Ever End?</u>, <u>The End of War</u>, <u>Peaceful Revolution</u>, and <u>The Art of Waging Peace</u>.

Chappell serves as the Peace Leadership Director for the Nuclear Age Peace Foundation. Lecturing across the country and internationally, he also teaches college courses and workshops on Peace Leadership, including a graduate-level course at the University of San Diego.

He grew up in Alabama, the son of a half-black and half-white father who fought in the Korean and Vietnam wars, and a Korean mother. Growing up in a violent household, Chappell has sought answers to the issues of war and peace, rage and trauma, and vision, purpose, and hope. ## Rotary Leadership Institute



How strong is your Rotary knowledge? Do you know the ins and outs of the Rotary International Foundation? Are you familiar with the differences between leading a business and leading a volunteer organization? Are you moving into a position of leadership in your club? A great way to develop the knowledge and leadership skills to make you more successful in Rotary leadership is to attend Rotary Leadership Institute classes. You will have that opportunity on Saturday, March 28 at the Greene County Career Center in Xenia!

Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) provides a unique opportunity for Rotarians

to become more familiar with the workings of Rotary, in turn, becoming more effective and committed leaders. Not an official Rotary program, it is a grassroots leadership development training series that is offered in districts throughout the world. Any Rotarian can attend, however, clubs will often pay the RLI attendance fee and it is suggested that clubs select engaged members who are chairs, or anyone in any leadership capacity in his or her club.

Most of us started out as Rotarians with little knowledge of how Rotary really works. Attendance at RLI can accelerate the process of "Rotarization," toward a more satisfying Rotary experience by giving you a thorough understanding of how things work. Also, while many of us are leaders in our businesses, leadership of volunteers is a much different experience. RLI provides important training in how to work with fellow members to accomplish important goals.

RLI is offered in three parts, each of which builds on the previous level. Each level consists of a daylong training session conducted by past District Governors, selected past Presidents, and past RI Directors. On March 28, we will be offering parts 1 and 2. If you have previously taken part 1, enroll in part 2. Part 3 will be offered in November.

## Troy



An essential aspect of being a successful student is having the right supplies to take notes, do homework and complete assignments on time. For the past 4 years, Troy Rotary members and the faculty at Heywood Elementary School have worked together to provide those supplies to students in need. "This is one of the programs we rely on to help the kids keep focused on learning each day during the school year," stated Maurice Sadler, principal of Heywood. He added that the "Winter Wear" project to supply coats, hats, scarves and gloves to children at the school who may need warm clothing is another program from the Heywood-Troy Rotary partnership that has been very successful.

For the backpack program, Heywood teachers and faculty identify students who would benefit from having the school supplies, based on a number of different criteria. Rotarian Patrick Titterington and his committee review the requests and then gather the supplies, paid for with money donated to the Troy Rotary Foundation. "So far this year, Rotary has delivered eight (8) backpacks filled with pencils, erasers, paper, spiral notebooks, tissue, crayons or colored pencils, protractors and glue sticks for kids at Heywood," said Titterington. All the backpacks are assembled before they are delivered to the school for distribution by the teachers. "It's thanks to donations to the Troy Rotary Foundation that we can continue to provide backpacks and warm winter wear to the children," Titterington shared, "and we are very pleased to lend our support this way."

In addition to these projects, Troy Rotarians also volunteer at Heywood as readers during the annual "Dr. Seuss Day" at the school on March  $2^{nd}$  in support of the National Education Association's "Read Across America" initiative.

## Versailles

The Versailles Interact Club recently held a book drive to collect children's books to replenish the bookcase when needed. This book drive netted over 4,300 books. The Versailles Rotary then sorted the books, stickered them and repacked them to deliver when necessary.
