Greetings from the District Governor

As I prepare to depart for my 18th Rotary International Convention in Sao Paulo, Brazil, I reflect back on my year as your District Governor. While I may not have accomplished all that I had hoped to this year, I feel that I leave the district just a little bit better than it was on July 1, 2014 when I took office.

This year, we have continued our successful Rotary Leadership Institute, which was started under the auspices of Past District Governor Mac Hickman. Not only have we held successful training sessions, but also our district now has its own team of trained facilitators and no longer has to rely on other districts for support.

Our youth programs have continued to thrive and three Interact clubs were chartered this year. We also added a new Rotaract club and our existing Rotaract clubs have continued to be strong. We had a successful RYLA program and the 4-Way Speech contest was again successful.

District leadership continues to be strong, and the additional of Mark Mabelitini to the District Governor line as the District Governor Nominee Designate brings a future District Governor to the northern portion of our district for the first time in many years. District Governor Bill Shula has recovered from his medical issues and is prepared to begin serving July 1. Right behind him will be Mike Kelly in 2016-2017, who will also provide us with excellent leadership.

Club leadership continues to grow, as many of our clubs added leaders this year to their rosters. Our commitment to the Rotary charity, The Rotary Foundation, remains strong, as evidenced by increased contributions this year.

We held a very successful District Conference in April, increasing our attendance by more than 50% from the previous two years. It is my hope that this trend will continue over the next few years to the point where our District Conference is the highlight of the Rotary year. Our tree-planting project at the National Museum of the United States Air Force was an outstanding success. We exceeded our goal of 25 trees by obtaining club funding for a total of 44 trees. Over the next few years visitors to the museum will be able to admire the beautiful trees as they flower each spring.

None of these accomplishments are mine, however. They all belong to you, the Rotarians in our district who work so hard to make Rotary a significant force, not only in southwest Ohio but in the world as well. Thank you all for the opportunity that you have provided me to be your leader for the past year. I hope that I have met your expectations. Light Up Rotary!

1000 Cherry Tree Project



On Sunday April 19 at 10 am close to 40 hardy District 6670 Rotary volunteers, their families and friends assembled at the Museum of the U.S. Air Force's Memorial Park to plant 50 Japanese Akebono and Yoshino cherry trees as a lasting contribution to this national historical site commerating the 2015 Rotary District Conference held at the Hope Hotel on the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base. Beavercreek Rotarian Kent Anderson chaired the project with Kim Senft-Paras of

the Centerville Club helping to organize the volunteers. Special kudos to Beavercreek Rotarian Shannon Graham and Dayton Rotarian Erik Collins and all the rest who stayed to the very end despite the storm.

A Letter From RI President Gary Huang

Dear Rotarian,



We express our profound sadness and extend our sympathies to all those affected by the devastation resulting from the 25 April deadly earthquake in Nepal. Rescue missions and emergency aid continue to arrive in Nepal for the 8 million people impacted by the massive 7.8 magnitude quake.

As we mourn the thousands of lost lives, Rotary joins many international agencies in providing immediate relief to survivors and mobilizing our expertise to support long-term recovery and rebuilding efforts.

How to help:

District 3292, Nepal, has established a disaster relief fund to provide needed equipment and supplies to affected communities. Contact <u>District Governor</u> <u>Kumar Piya</u> for information about contributing to the fund.

Rotary's service partner <u>ShelterBox</u> is working closely with Nepali Rotarians to coordinate immediate relief efforts. On Monday, 27 April, and Wednesday, 29 April, Rotarians greeted ShelterBox response teams in Nepal who will mobilize temporary housing and relief efforts. An initial 1,000 housing tents and 1,000 shelter kits will be distributed throughout affected communities. Two more ShelterBox relief teams and additional kits are ready to be deployed once further assessments are complete Learn more about supporting ShelterBox's relief efforts.

As with all disasters, the Rotary family may <u>apply for global grants</u> to support long-term recovery efforts in Nepal. Once immediate health, safety, and relief efforts have been addressed, work with local Nepali Rotary members and their international partners to develop projects within Rotary's six areas of focus.

Changes to My Rotary

Rotary International has introduced several changes to the Club & District Administration pages that will make our administrative tasks easier:

The most significant change is to the terms of access. Incoming club and district officers will have access to club and district information by 1 June. Most outgoing club and district officers will retain access to the information for 12 months. This means that incoming club officers can get a head start setting up goals and managing club information. It also means that the midnight shut off on June 30 will not occur for certain club officers, allowing them to finish up previously started tasks and creating a smoother turnover to the new officers.

Quick links have also been created to allow you to easily reach frequently accessed pages.: You'll be able to designate favorite links from the Club & District Administration section and access them from your My Rotary dashboard. <u>See an example.</u>

All of the report and landing pages have been redesinged. Related activities will be grouped together on Club & District Administration pages. See <u>an example</u> and the <u>new landing page</u>. While you may find it a bit confusing at first, all of your previous reports are still there, albiet in different places than previously.
