Shoes for Orphan Souls District Shoe Drive



Shoes for Orphan Souls is a collaborative service project between Buckner International and Rotary District 6670. We have been providing shoes and socks for 8 years for children living in orphanages and impoverished communities where Buckner provides a variety of holistic services. Our Shoe Drive was very successful last year. We collected over 1500 pair of shoes and close to 1000 pairs of socks. We want to increase that number by 20% this year. Last year the Williamsburg Club collected 201 shoes, 31 socks, and 50 shoe laces. What Club will out do them this year?

So rally the troupes and get busy collecting shoes. Many Clubs have already begun the effort. We officially kick off the Shoe Drive in January when you will receive your Shoes for Orphan Souls Shoe Drive packet from Buckner, but you are encouraged to begin the process now. The culmination of the Shoe Drive is at the District Conference April 29th and 30th. Contact local businesses, churches, organizations, and schools within your community to join you in your collection. Utilize your Interact and Roteract Clubs to work with you.

We take shoes and socks for granted, but for many children around the world, they are a luxury. Shoes protect feet from diseases such as hookworm, which can lead to physical and cognitive development issues. Let's pull together and provide these much needed shoes.

Tipp City Rotary Supports a Tilapia Farm in Tanzania, Africa

Tipp City Rotary is proud to announce their most recent locally initiated International Project of supporting Smiles of Hope's Tilapia Farm with a gift of \$2,500.00. Smiles of Hope is a charity founded by Dr. Alvetro, she built, supports and manages the Angel House Orphanage and Secondary School in Tarime, Tanzania. Dr. Allemang has also been instrumental in the project and has participated in multiple dental working trips to Tarime, Tanzania, and Ecuador.

Tipp City Rotarians financial support helped to cover the cost to build the Tilapia Farm in Africa, and the Club matched their contributions. Tipp City Rotary currently has 70 members, was established on

January 1, 1922, and its motto is 'Service Above Self'.

Tipp City Rotary's gift has allowed the tilapia farm to be built and the tilapia have been "planted". In about 5-6 months the fish will grow to a size that is acceptable to eat. Through the tilapia pond the children of the Angel House Orphanage will have a new source of protein in their diets that allows them to grow and live a healthier lifestyle.

Tipp City Rotary has also been involved in helping to shrink polio cases worldwide for the past 36 years. Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Nigeria are the only three remaining polio endemic countries left. The crippling disease is now on the cusp of being eradicated. With the help of many other organizations like Rotary, we expect to end polio by 2018, making it the second infectious disease to be eradicated.

Dayton Rotary Club Receives an RI Global Grant!



The International Service Project Committee of the Dayton Rotary Club is pleased to announce the award of a Rotary International Global Grant (GG1527124) in the amount of \$31,780. The total project budget is \$55,350. The Dayton Rotary Club is partnering with the Eziukwu-Aba Rotary Club in Nigeria to provide clean water, new latrines and supplies to a health clinic and school in

Umunkpeyi Mbawsi. Presently the students and the staff at the clinic have to walk several kilometers to obtain water, which limits the time the students can spend in school and the services which can be provided at the clinic. The impact of clean, available water to this school and health clinic will bring a marked improvement in the lives, sanitation and health of this community.

The project includes providing a solar powered borehole to provide water, outfitting a clinic, providing two septic systems for school and clinic sanitation, and instituting a science curriculum in the school. The International Service Project Committee of the Dayton Rotary Club would like to invite other clubs which might like to take part in an international project to participate in this exciting opportunity. This project has a number of components which are available to be sponsored by interested clubs or individuals. Local Rotary clubs have collaborated for years to help keep residents safe during the holiday season through the Designated Driver button campaign. The recent holidays marked the 15th straight year that the Miami County area did not have an alcohol-related death, thanks, in part, to the program.

Dr. Michael Pope is the chairman of the Designated Driver program that is led by Troy Rotary. He works with the Miami County Sheriff, Ohio Highway Patrol and other local Rotary clubs to distribute thousands of gold and blue Designated Driver buttons through local banks, bars and state liquor stores. "The goal of our program is to help people stay safe as they celebrate during the holidays, not to stop them from having fun," said Pope. The buttons are a visual reminder to make plans to have a designated driver before leaving home. Pope's mantra each year is "Be safe, safe, safe when you celebrate."

Have You Adopted the New Rotary International Brand Standards on Your Club Website?



International has spent a great deal of time and money to develop a new branding initiative for clubs. The new logo, along with the new color scheme, have been heavily researched for maximum impact in local communities and around the globe. Presidents and District Governors have been charged with encouraging clubs to adopt these new standards this Rotary year.

In March 2015, the Cincinnati and Toledo Rotary Clubs formed a partnership to create state-of-the-art websites which are responsive (smart phone and tablet friendly) along with adopting the new RI branding. The sites were developed by the Thread Group, which is owned by Joe Sharp, a 20+year member of the Rotary Club of Toledo. As part of the development of the two club sites, The Thread group created a template so other Rotary Clubs anywhere in the world could have their sites built on the same platform at a fraction of the cost. The site includes a link for members into Club Runner or DaCdb, a donation button, a Member Dues Payment option, a robust calendar, and so much more! So, here's the good news for your club! Together, Toledo and Cincinnati spent \$33,000+ to develop the template but the cost for other clubs to get the same website is only \$9,000. Of the \$9,000, \$1,500 goes to the Rotary Foundation of Cincinnati, \$1,500 goes to the Rotary Foundation of Toledo and \$6,000 goes to the Thread Group for the customization of a club's site.
